Friends in Christ—

As I said in my sermon on the last Sunday in January, national and world events are moving so fast that a sermon that seems appropriate on Thursday might be woefully out of date by the time Sunday morning arrives. After quickly rewriting my sermon on Saturday, I told you that I had a feeling that we are moving into a time when there might be a lot of incomplete and inarticulate sermons.

Now I find—for a much happier reason—that I need to write a new article for this newsletter.

I want express my heartfelt thanks to our congregation for the very generous and completely surprising bonus that you gave to me during our annual meeting on January 29. Speaking to you out of my astonishment that morning, I know that I was "incomplete and inarticulate." But I am grateful for this expression of your support for my ministry here. Derek Willard's kind words spoke of much that we have achieved together over the past 9½ years. Among all that he mentioned, I was grateful for his comment that I have helped our church give greater expression to our Open and Affirming commitments *begun during Bruce Fischer's pastorate here*. I have always given thanks for the leadership of Bruce as well as that of Ed Heininger and others before me. I am proud to be the heir of their ministry.

As I give thanks for all that we have done, I realize that it is time to look forward. And indeed with all the changes here we have begun to do that. A while ago I read an article about a minister's first ten years in a congregation. I want to share what it says about year ten:

If you have lasted up to the tenth year and have invested well in your tenure of ministry, you and your congregation share a mutual relationship of trust, a shared corporate identity, and a common vision of ministry. Your relationship with the congregation can provide the resources to begin working on whom you can become. ...Your pastoral leadership function will take on new directions...and now is the time to begin thinking about the life of this congregation two or three generations into the future. Now is the time your ministry begins.

As we give thanks for our past, let us join together this year in thinking about the church that we want to become.

SHELTER HOUSE BOOK SALE, 2017

The Shelter House Used Book Sale will be March 25 and 26. The site will be the Johnson County Fairgrounds. As always, we need as many books as possible. Historically we have received 20,000 books for the sale, and last year we earned \$17,000 for the Shelter House. People are encouraged to drop off their books in late February and March at the Fairgrounds, but pick ups can be scheduled. We will definitely transport books from Rockwood Hall, and you can bring your book donations to the church at any time. **Contact Donna Hirst if you need assistance in transporting books to the sale site**, <u>donna-hirst@uiowa.edu</u>.

Because of the location we only have late February and March for the sorting. All the books will need to be boxed by subject in an adjoining building and moved to the sale building the week before the sale. We will need far more volunteers than we've had in the past. During March Sorting, Boxing, and Moving books will occur:

- Feb.26, 3/5, 3/12, 3/19 **1:00-3:00** (Sundays)
- 2/27, 3/6, 3/13 **10:00-2:00** (Mondays)
- 3/1, 3/8, 3/15 **10:00-2:00** (Wed.)
- 3/4,3/11,3/18 **10:00-2:00** (Sat.)
- Set up for the sale will occur March 20-24 (9:00-4:00).
- Volunteering for a day does not commit you to 8 hours, but only as many hours as you have to donate.

Volunteer tasks:

- Incoming boxes of donated books will need to be sorted into subject categories. We will potentially receive 20,000 books.
- All books will need to be boxed according to their subject.
- Boxes of books will need to be moved to a staging area; beginning March 20 boxes will need to be moved into the sale building; and some unsold books will need to be moved out of the sale room.

Our Children's Library "I'm Right Here" By Constance Ørbeck-Nilssen Illustrated by Akin Duzakin

This is a more serious book than we've encountered in quite some time. The subject is fear. Fear is familiar to both the young and the old, but in surprisingly different ways.

Seeking reassurance about his own fears while on a walk with his grandmother, William asks her about her fears. He probably thinks she'll list things like loud noises or thunder or even barking dogs. As it turns out, she tells him that she fears losing the things she loves—like birds singing or swans swimming or him. Their time together talking manages to calm both of their fears. Children from age 4 through 8 could learn from this book.

"In this poignant story, an anxious boy walks through a forest with his grandmother. . . . When William asks her what she is afraid of, she says, 'I'm afraid that I won't see the swans down in the pond. . . . I'm afraid of never again seeing those proud white birds gliding across the water.' . . . When William's grandmother explains that it's the losses that will accompany her eventual death that frighten her, he offers her solace. Duzakin alternates between the softly lit forest scenes and ominous, gray depictions of Williams's fear-driven scenarios while Ørbeck-Nilssen maintains a gentle, comforting tone, emphasizing screnity over gloominess."—*Publishers Weekly*

"This unusual story is about a little boy named William who, while taking a walk with his grandma, asks her if she is ever afraid. They then compare their fears. The little boy is afraid of typical things that scare kids, like angry dogs, stinging wasps, dangerous fires, sharks, wars, thunder, and lightning.

The grandmother, amazingly honest for a kid's book, points out the things she is afraid of, such as never again seeing flowers in bloom, or hearing the birds sing in the springtime. The boy doesn't get it.

Grandma explains that when she was young, she had fears more like those of the little boy. Now that she is old, 'I'm just afraid of losing everything I love.' She explains, 'When we get old, we die,' says Grandma, 'and then I won't be able to see you anymore.'

He asks, couldn't she see him from wherever she goes? And couldn't she then still see the flowers and birds, and 'everything'? 'You are absolutely right,' says Grandma.

So, the boy concludes, Grandma needn't be afraid anymore.

This books provides a very nice way to teach small children about the different perspectives of children and adults and to open discussions about fears in general and about death in particular."—*Kid Lit Review*

Look for this book (and others) on the library shelves in Rockwood Hall. Explore the rest of our library for additional worthwhile reading.
