TABLE TO TABLE NEEDS VOLUNTEERS

Table to Table's budget is small and our task is great. Volunteers are an essential element of our organization and provide the means for us to pursue our mission. We are an independent food rescue organization with a mission to keep wholesome, edible food from going to waste by collecting it from donors and distributing to those in need through agencies that serve the hungry, homeless and at-risk population in the Johnson County area. Our volunteer roles include route driver (or passenger), data entry, cleaning vans, special events, and serving on the board of directors. Last year Table to Table rescued over 1.8 million pounds of food, and redirected it to local social service agencies. That's 900 tons of wholesome food kept out of the landfill.

OPPORTUNITY TO HOST AN EXCHANGE STUDENT

The Iowa City AM Rotary is looking for host families to provide room, board and a family environment for a young woman from Spain who will be attending City High in 2017-18 school year. Rotary normally finds three families to host, each for around 3-1/2 months, between mid-August and June/July when the student goes home.

Host family members do not need to be Rotarians, nor do they necessarily need to have students attending City High. Successful host families have come in all shapes and sizes. What is required is for the family to welcome the exchange student into their home not as a guest, but as a member of the family for the time they are living with that family.

The student who will be arriving approximately one week before school starts in August is a young woman who will turn 17 during her stay in the U.S. She particularly enjoys music and the visual arts, as well as reading and getting together with friends. One sport she enjoys is swimming.

☐ Empowering You for Political Action


☐ Becoming an Effective Volunteer & Ally

"Survivor's Club, the True Story Of a Very Young Prisoner of Auschwitz"

Written By Michael Bornstein and Debbie Borstein Holinstat

Quoted from cover of book:

"In 1945, in a now-famous piece of archival footage from the Holocaust, four-year-old Michael Bornstein was filmed by Soviet soldiers being carried out of Auschwitz in his grandmother's arms. *Survivors Club* tells the unforgettable story of how a father's courageous wit, a mother's fierce love, and one perfectly timed illness saved Michael's life, and how others in his family from Zarki, Poland, dodged death at the hands of the Nazis time and again with incredible deftness and luck. Working from his own recollections as well as extensive interviews with relatives and survivors who knew the family, Michael relates his inspirational story with the help of his daughter, Debbie Bornstein Holinstat. Shocking, heartbreaking, and ultimately uplifting, this narrative nonfiction offers an indelible depiction of what happened to one Polish village in the wake of the German invasion in 1939."

Michael Borstein immigrated as a young boy to the United States 6 years after his liberation from Auschwitz. He graduated from Fordham University, earned his Ph.D. from the University of Iowa, and worked in pharmaceutical research and development for more than 40 years. Now retired, Michael lives with his wife in New York City and New Jersey and speaks frequently at schools and other groups about his experiences in the Holocaust. He was recently here in Iowa City speaking and telling his story. Debbie Bornstein Holinstat is the third of Michael's four children. A producer for NBC and MSNBC News, she lives in New Jersey. Debbie worked with her father to help him research and write his memoir.

"Pete the Cat: I Love My White Shoes"

How many of us stop to realize just how much a positive outlook "colors" our lives? We all encounter disappointment. It's how we deal with that disappointment that can make our lives richer and us stronger.

Often, in the end, we see that disappointments are just God's way of saying, "I've got something better."

"This one's a kid-pleaser, with funny, memorable text, bright colors, visual humor, and a downloadable song to boot. For such a simple story, it's a page-turner too—kids will be eager to see what happens next, even after many readings. They'll giggle at Pete inadvertently stepping into a pile of blueberries, which on the page looks more like an ocean of blueberries. Each time he stains his shoes, Pete looks a bit peeved, but within a few beats he's back in his groove, embracing the latest shade of his sneakers.

"The watercolor illustrations by James Dean flow with a jazzy cool of their own. Some literal-minded kids might take issue when the red shoes get stained by blueberries and turn blue instead of purple—but as Pete probably would say, it's no big deal."—Darienne Stewart, Common Sense Media

"Pete the Cat, the iconic creation of artist Dean and subject of dozens of paintings, debuts as a children's picture book hero in this rollicking, rhyming ditty. Children's musical entertainer Litwin, outfits his hero in spanking new white shoes. Proud of these sparkling treads, Pete strides along until he steps in a large pile of something colorful (strawberries), transforming the shining sneakers. Poor Pete the Cat! But Pete doesn't let his shoes' new hues get him down, 'Did Pete cry? Goodness, no!' Pete repeats his cheerful

refrain through several colorful if unlikely fashion mishaps and concludes, 'It's all good.' The illustrations, in vibrant primary colors, pace the story in much the same way as Litwin's musical telling does. Part color concept book, part tribute to optimism, part sing-along, I Love My White Shoes is recommended for ages 3 to 7 and for library story programs. Count on an even wider age range of appeal if pairing the book with musical storytelling."—Vanessa Cowie. Forsyth County Public Library

Look for this book (and others) on the library shelves in Rockwood Hall. Explore the rest of our library for additional worthwhile reading.
