Friends in Christ-

I usually use this space to write something about the life of the congregation. But recently two other members have spoken or written eloquent words that capture who we are and both encourage and challenge us as we move into the future. Jeff Barton spoke to the congregation as he led worship on his final Sunday with us before moving to Colorado. And Raven Rowe wrote a Facebook post about her experience at this year's Iowa City Pride Fest. With their permission, I share their thoughts with all of you. -- Peace, Bill

Jeff Barton said to the congregation gathered for worship:

In spite of, as well as because of, the particularities of any local church, it is true that people come and go from the life of a congregation. My wife and I are moving to Colorado this week, where next Sunday I'll be the guest preacher at the UCC congregation that discerned my call for ordained ministry long before I was willing to be aware of it, almost 40 years ago. Thus, with my own significant history and experience as a pastor with, a participant in, and an observer of many congregations, I wanted to say thank-you and offer my appreciation for the life and spirit of this congregation. No local church has it all figured out all the time. But here in Iowa City, Congregational UCC does offer a uniquely wonderful sense of thoughtful theology, strong traditional worship, a courageous contemporary social engagement, a warm yet patient spirit, and—most of all—a generous and deep commitment to remain vibrant and adaptable to the future set before us in the "town and gown" community where we live and serve.

May God continue to give you a meaningful way towards significant truth and abundant life together. I pray that you will know my sincere thanks for including me in your life over the past few years, and also that I will continue to pray for you as individuals and, especially, as a congregation united to be a church of Christ's teaching and spirit. Thank you. Bless you.

And Raven Row wrote on Facebook:

"Today.... My PRIDE is not just PRIDE for being queer. It's PRIDE for being able to share this narrative, with like hundreds of different people today:

I'm here with my church. I married my wife there 6 years ago. This woman over here ... She married her wife at our church too. This church doesn't only marry queer people, but they ordain them too. And in 8 weeks, this church is going to ordain me. As a gay / queer minister. Not only is my church okay with me being gay, but they have financially supported me in going to seminary, both my local church and my denomination, so that I could get my Master's degree and become a leader in the church.

This right here, is the most important message of my ministry. God doesn't hate me. God loves me. God doesn't hate you. God loves you.

Christ's church doesn't hate you. Christ's church loves you.

That isn't about me at all. It's about my God. It's about my church. I have so much PRIDE for the UCC. It has truly changed my entire life. I just get to smile when people tell me that they didn't know that there were churches like this out there. I know. I didn't know this either. I met a gay minister. And I wanted to find out- What church is this, that even ordains queers?

And about Christ?

Who is this, that even eats with queers? The same who that calls them "to preside at the table."

#### **BREAD FOR THE WORLD UPDATE**

In May several members of Congregational UCC wrote letters to support funding for programs that help hungry and struggling people in our country and worldwide. These letters were included in Bread for the World's 2017 Offering of Letters that were shared with legislators during the spring lobby day.

Steve Panther, who led an adult education session on the Offering of Letters writes:

The lobby day was a great experience. Nearly 500 people came to DC for the event. It was the largest number of participants for many years. As it turns out, I was the only Iowan. However, I didn't go to the meetings alone.

Tom Chacko received his PhD in business from the U of I and he retired from teaching business at Iowa State. He and his wife moved to DC to be near their children. So, he counted as an Iowan. He will be a good DC contact. Matt Gross, the Bread organizer, also attended, so I was in good hands.

Both North Dakota and Kansas had just one person. One Alaskan traveled 12 hours to attend. By email, I arranged to take a taxi with the man from North Dakota. For meeting in the hotel's lobby, he said he was tall and would be wearing a cowboy hat. He was right out of central casting; a tall, lean, handsome, cattle rancher wearing a cowboy hat. Turns out he had been a state senator for 10 years and had worked in the Obama administration for 2 years. He was a real North Dakotan Jimmy Stewart.

We did not talk with our senators directly. Instead we met with legislative assistants. Sen. Grassley's person was more skeptical. That was expected. Sen. Ernst's person was very nice and said all the right things. There were no real commitments, but they did want follow-up information. Generally, they said the budget process was in the early stages.

Congressman Loebsack was called to the floor for a vote, so we did not get to talk. However, I waited for a picture with him. Also, I wanted to thank him for his leadership in supporting domestic and foreign assistance programs. All of the letters were hand delivered. Thank you all for your support.

#### **BOX FAN PROJECT GIFT – HOT COFFEE PROVIDES A COOL BREEZE**

It is hot out there. Our congregation is helping people stay cool, though. At the direction of the Mission Board, we delivered a check for \$1225.84 to the Crisis Center on Thursday, June 15 to help purchase box fans for those without air conditioning or unable to afford to run their air conditioning. We then had an additional donation of \$200 from a family in the Congregation. Each fan costs \$15, so we will provide a total of ninety-five box fans. That first donation came from the Coffee Project Fund. For over fifteen years we have been offering Equal Exchange coffee, tea, chocolate, and other products for sale. Initiated by Donna Goodnow, carried on by Sharyn Reitz, and then expanded (and made more fun) by Martha Anne Crawford, we have sold Equal Exchange products for a very small markup. The result...\$1225.84 to help those in need in our community.

Good coffee for Iowa City, a fair price to growers, and now a cool breeze for those who need a hand. Thank you, Equal Exchange coffee drinkers! Thank you, Martha Anne, who kept the program going. And thank you, generous members of our church.

#### **MOBILE FOOD PANTRY UPDATE**

This spring our Mission Board made a commitment to support a new Crisis Center Mobile Food Pantry that will provide food to students and parents at Southeast Junior High School. A grant from Johnson County covers 65% of the \$7740 needed. Congregational UCC, continuing our longstanding commitment to feed body and soul will provide the other 35% of the funding—\$2700. As of June 18, members have given \$1930 toward this amount. The Mission Board is giving \$500 to this project. Any final need will be funded through our Engagement Fund, which is used for any initiatives that will enhance our presence in the community through its service to it, both "community" and "service" broadly defined. #### TABLE TO TABLE NEEDS VOLUNTEERS

Table to Table's budget is small and our task is great. Volunteers are an essential element of our organization and provide the means for us to pursue our mission. We are an independent food rescue organization with a mission to keep wholesome, edible food from going to waste by collecting it from donors and distributing to those in need through agencies that serve the hungry, homeless and at-risk population in the Johnson County area. Our volunteer roles include route driver (or passenger), data entry, cleaning vans, special events, and serving on the board of directors. Last year Table to Table rescued over 1.8 million pounds of food, and redirected it to local social service agencies. That's 900 tons of wholesome food kept out of the landfill.

The Iowa City AM Rotary is looking for host families to provide room, board and a family environment for a young woman from Spain who will be attending City High in 2017-18 school year. Rotary normally finds three families to host, each for around 3-1/2 months, between mid-August and June/July when the student goes home.

Host family members do not need to be Rotarians, nor do they necessarily need to have students attending City High. Successful host families have come in all shapes and sizes. What is required is for the family to welcome the exchange student into their home not as a guest, but as a member of the family for the time they are living with that family.

The student who will be arriving approximately one week before school starts in August is a young woman who will turn 17 during her stay in the U.S. She particularly enjoys music and the visual arts, as well as reading and getting together with friends. One sport she enjoys is swimming.

#### VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL

Our Congregational UCC Vacation Bible School was a three-day adventure! Using a VBS curriculum offered by Heifer Project International, our theme was to understand why and how we help feed the world daily food, just as we receive food every day. Through conversations and stories about families, we discussed what families need to survive. One of the most important things, as a 4-year-old James Keogh stated, "families need hugs and kisses." That was a great way to start our understanding.

Each child made a cut-out of their family, which you should check out on the bulletin board in Rockwood Hall, demonstrating the health of each one. But we realized that not all families around the world are as healthy as ours'. So we learned about different animals that Heifer sends to people who are hungry and how these animals are used to help them.

We are very fortunate to have Farmer Kate Edwards in our congregation. She farms vegetables on 7+ acres north of Iowa City and we visited her to learn why she likes to farm, what she grows and what she does with her vegetables. We learned that while she sells most of them to local buyers, she donates all the extra to the Coral-ville Food Pantry. She turned us all loose in the sweet pea patch with a plastic bag so we could take some home. Most of us ate as many as we bagged!

At the Scattergood School Farm, we learned about pigs and got to pet piglets. We took turns feeding two baby goats with big milk bottles and ate our fill of strawberries from the farm's large patch.

On Wednesday, we visited the Coralville Food Pantry, taking them several boxes and bags of donated food, including sweet peas and asparagus from one of the farms. We not only saw all the different foods that the Pantry gives to hungry people in the County, we got to help stock shelves, clean chairs and fix up the Little Library of children's books.

Our three days together were, indeed, an adventure which we're glad to share with you through this report and photos taken by our wonderful leaders: Ruth Kuntz, Claire Ashman, Tina Koepnick, Terry Macey, Robin Groff, Ed Keogh, Erin Brown, Anna Mary Mueller and Amy Lewis. ## "Hidden Figures"

The true story of the black female mathematicians at NASA whose calculations helped fuel some of America's greatest achievements in space.

Quoted from cover of the book: "Before John Glenn orbited the earth, or Neil Armstrong walked on the moon, a group of dedicated female mathematicians known as 'human computers' used pencils, slide rules, and adding machines to calculate the numbers that would launch rockets, and astronauts, into space.

Among these problem-solvers were a group of exceptionally talented African American women. Originally math teachers in the South's segregated public schools these gifted professionals answered Uncle Sam's call during the labor shortages of World War II. With new jobs at the fascinating, high-energy world of the Langley Memorial Aeronautical Laboratory in Hampton, Virginia, they finally had a shot at jobs that would push their skills to the limits.

Even as Virginia's Jim Crow laws required them to be segregated from their white counterparts, the women of Langley's all-black 'West Computing' group helped America achieve one of the things it desired most: a decisive victory over the Soviet Union in the Cold War, and complete domination of the heavens.

Starting in World War II and moving through to the Cold War, the Civil Rights Movement and the Space Race, "Hidden Figures" follows the interwoven accounts of Dorothy Vaughan, Mary Jackson, Katherine Johnson, and Christine Darden--four African American women who participated in some of NASA'S greatest successes. It chronicles their careers over nearly three decades as they faced challenges, forged alliances, and used their intellect to change their own lives, and their country's future."
