Last week I read about the legendary Jewish cable that read: "Start worrying. Details to follow." I often feel as though that's the advice we've been following for the past year. It's been an extraordinary time of challenge and uncertainty for our nation. We can worry about the gun violence that shocks but is no longer unthinkable. We can worry about rising white nationalism that is careening toward normalcy. We can worry about the degradation of our planet and the degradation of our discourse.

Details to follow.

Recently I've been aware of how exhausted I've been by all of this. And I sense that many others are as well. And a recent column by Roger Cohen shook me out of some of this despair when he wrote: "America is still 'this big, boisterous, brawling, intemperate, striving, daring, beautiful, bountiful, brave, magnificent country,' as Senator John McCain, Republican of Arizona, put it the other day...Lament grows tiresome, as does a very high and righteous moral tone. Life is a curve, not a straight line. Of all the virtues, surely stoicism, decency and forgiveness rate near the top — particularly in a culture of facile complaint, indecent vanity and vindictive piling-on. Silence seems to me a near-forgotten quality."

And I began to remember all those wonderful, daring, merciful, and bold things that have been happening around here in the last twelve months: the outpouring of support for members who went to Standing Rock to protect the land there; the generosity shown in our giving to One Great Hour of Sharing in the spring and to the hurricane relief offering this fall; children singing in worship and taking up more and more room in Rockwood Hall after worship; our growing and evolving ministry with refugees and immigrants in Iowa City; the courage of members who are exploring our own racism and white privilege; our presence on the Ped Mall during Pride Fest. We have come this far by grace, sheer grace. That is cause once more for thanksgiving, for gratitude. We are the heirs of a glorious and troubled past, living in a troubled and sometimes fearful present. And with some slight echo of gratitude in our hearts we might go forward with some modicum of compassion for others. We might show some basic Christian love, some basic Christian decency.

Even as we worry, let us give thanks.

#### WELCOMING THE STRANGER A NOTE FROM YOUR MISSION BOARD

Our Christian faith calls us to be welcoming to strangers. Our congregation has responded in many different ways over the years to that call, especially providing a welcoming presence for refugees and immigrants. We are presently in a time where immigrants in our community feel fearful – threatened with detention and possible deportation. The Center for Worker Justice is currently working with faith communities to be responsive to situations that may arise and supportive to families affected.

Our Mission Board is hoping that we can gather resources to be helpful when such needs do arise. Specifically we would like to have a list of members who could provide skills and services to a family we would offer to help in a time of crisis. If a parent is detained, the other parent and children may need both emotional and logistical support until the situation can be resolved. Skills and time needed might include the following: Shopping for food or clothing or collecting such from various resources; transportation to appointments or shopping; babysitting, translating and interpreting – particularly Spanish. Please be in touch with me in person, by e-mail **pgoeldner@earthlink.net** or by phone 319-338-1541 if you can offer time and skills to this effort or would like more information. I know this sounds a little vague about time and specifics but we know these situations are happening. CWJ and the committee are presently working with a family in Iowa City facing deportation.

This faith initiative that CWJ is putting together is still a work in progress. There are four working committees: Sanctuary, Rapid Response Teams, Legal Assistance and Human Services (family support described above.) The next meeting is November 13<sup>th</sup> at 6pm at the CWJ offices at 614 Gilbert Court. Donna Hirst, Megan Carnes, Lee Wood, Paula Forest and I have been attending.

## NEW BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

For the past two years our adult education classes have taken time to examine and learn about issues of racial justice. We initially focused on a study prepared by the United Church of Christ on white privilege. When we completed this study, many of us felt that we had more to learn. We compiled a book list from various members of our congregation and formed two book study groups that met throughout the year. *Waking Up White* by Debby Irving was our introductory book. One group followed with *Tears We Cannot Stop* by Michael Eric Dyson and the other group read and discussed *The Autobiography of Malcolm X* as told to Alex Haley.

This has been a very meaningful, thoughtful, and life changing study as we listen to the voices of our fellow Americans. These writers are reaching out, sometimes in despair, to call attention to the fact that many in our country have been denied their rights as citizens by institutionalized racism. We have grown to understand that all of us suffer when racial barriers exist and that we can never become the country that our constitution promises until we all can understand and become allies in this journey.

This year, the theme for our church is "Who is Our Neighbor?" We have decided that our book study fits this theme very well. Therefore, we will continue our study in January of 2018 with Michelle Alexander's book *The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness*. We would like to reach out to those of you who have an interest in this topic and strongly encourage you to join us in this journey. If you are just starting out, we recommend that you read *Waking Up White* by Debby Irving. If you would like to read and discuss this book before January, there will be a sign-up sheet downstairs at the church. Also, we will have a sign-up sheet for the January book study by Michelle Alexander. There will be copies of our book list for additional reading on the table as well.

# Our Adult Library "The Radium Girls, the Dark Story of America's Shining Women"

Excerpts from book review in Seattle Times, republished in Cedar Rapids Gazette:

The young women sat in rows, heads bent, painting numbers on paper watch and clock faces with luminous paint. The paint that the workers were using in the first decades of the 20th century was not ordinary. It contained radium, a highly radioactive element, and the stuff was inescapable.

In "Radium Girls" author Kate Moore honors the lives of the painters as well as their deaths. She tells the compelling story of women whose work maimed and killed them while their employers, their doctors and their government turned a blind eye to their suffering.

The painters at the Radium Dial Co. and the Radium Luminous Materials Corp. were told repeatedly that radium wasn't dangerous, even though warnings about radioactivity had been trickling out since 1906. By the mid-1920's, the sick dial painters began to put two and two together. Their employers continued to turn them away, referring to them as a "menace" and blaming "women's clubs" for the painters' audacity to try to uncover the truth.

A determined group of sick women, knowing their days were numbered, was successful. In 1939 the U.S. Supreme Court declined Radium Dial's latest appeal, and the dial painters won. Survivors would be compensated and their death certificates would state their demise was workplace related.

By the time World War II broke out "dial painting" was the most feared occupation among young women and the government introduced new safety standards for those working with radium. A Manhattan Project scientist insisted that the same protections be offered to those working with an equally lethal substance, plutonium, because of the Radium Girls.
