Friends in Christ:

The season of Advent begins with lamentation.

On the early Sundays of December we hear the prophet Isaiah crying out "O that God would tear open the heavens and come down, so that the mountains would quake at God's presence." (Isaiah 64:1) and reminding us "The grass withers and the flower fades when the breath of the Lord blows upon it; surely the people are grass." (Isaiah 40: 7) The Psalmist, too, cries out, "Restore us, O God; let your face shine, that we may be saved." (Psalm 80:3)

In these days, the ancient anguish in scripture seems to find an echo in our own distressed spirits. Each day seems to bring new revelations of sexual misconduct by men in power. Each day brings a new mass shooting although many no longer make the news. Each day brings reports of the upheaval of nations, of war and rumors of war. The opioid crisis grows. Racism continues unabated. We, too, lament and cry, "O that God would tear open the heavens and come down!"

This, of course, is not the first December, the first Advent filled with distressing news. And even in distressing times we are called to the joy of these days as well.

Joy has very little to do with being happy—maybe nothing at all. It has little to do with our good fortune. It's an energy that comes most often when things are grim or painful. Joy comes uninvited and at the most unexpected times.

Rejoicing. Exulting. Taking delight in something. Call it what you want. It's one way that people find the energy to move toward compassion and sharing and beating swords into plowshares. Joy is one of the ways that we move into new life. We can learn by the careful observation of our own delight—and you will find that this delight, this *joy* has the capacity to energize.

There is a joy that is deeper than the good times and bad times that life hands out, stronger than our best attempts and worst failings—a joy that lifts us when we cannot lift ourselves, a peace that grasps us and returns us renewed.

Even in the worst of times, God is giving birth to a new possibility—the reconciliation of God and humankind. This creative birth, like all births, can be long and difficult. Christmas is not for children alone. It also comes to the often weary and jaded adults that we have become. We hear the good news that God is still at work in the world, so that the world that *is* more and more becomes the world as it *might be*.

In the days ahead, we draw closer to the heart of the meaning of this season. God moves toward humankind in Jesus Christ, reconciling a waiting world, redeeming all creation.


COMING SOON! A BOOK YOU WON'T WANT TO MISS

This year, the theme for our church is "Who is Our Neighbor?" We have decided that our book study fits this theme very well. Therefore, we will continue our study in January of 2018 with Michelle Alexander's book *The New Jim Crow: Mass Incarceration in the Age of Colorblindness*. We would like to reach out to those of you who have an interest in this topic and strongly encourage you to join us in this journey. If you are just starting out, we recommend that you read *Waking Up White* by Debby Irving. If you would like to read and discuss this book before January, there will be a sign-up sheet downstairs at the church. Also, we will have a sign-up sheet for the January book study by Michelle Alexander. There will be copies of our book list for additional reading on the table as well.

As part of our "Who Are Our Neighbors?" adult education sessions this fall, Valerie Garr, from the Diversity Office at the UI College of Nursing met with the Sunday morning group. Afterwards she wrote: "I enjoyed the great conversation that we had and really do feel encouraged that community members in the Iowa City area are truly interested and engages in the holistic experiences of minority students who seek to make Iowa City and the UI their 'home away from home.' With congregations like yours at the forefront of taking an active stand on issues impacting diverse communities, I have no reservations that you and your members are walking the talk and as a result, making positive change to better our overall community."

NEW BOOK DISCUSSION GROUP

For the past two years our adult education classes have taken time to examine and learn about issues of racial justice. We initially focused on a study prepared by the United Church of Christ on white privilege. When we completed this study, many of us felt that we had more to learn. We compiled a book list from various members of our congregation and formed two book study groups that met throughout the year. *Waking Up White* by Debby Irving was our introductory book. One group followed with *Tears We Cannot Stop* by Michael Eric Dyson and the other group read and discussed *The Autobiography of Malcolm X* as told to Alex Haley.

This has been a very meaningful, thoughtful, and life changing study as we listen to the voices of our fellow Americans. These writers are reaching out, sometimes in despair, to call attention to the fact that many in our country have been denied their rights as citizens by institutionalized racism. We have grown to understand that all of us suffer when racial barriers exist and that we can never become the country that our constitution promises until we all can understand and become allies in this journey.

JOIN THE CRC RAPID RESPONSE COMMITTEE

Immigrants in our community are under increasing threat of deportation and incarceration by ICE (Immigration Customs and Enforcement).

As part of the recent efforts of faith communities to provide support for immigrants in our community, the Center for Worker Justice has formed committees to work on material support (food, housing, childcare, etc.), legal assistance, sanctuary support, and "rapid response" to raids and detentions. All of the committees need active participants and your help is needed!

The "rapid response" committee in particular would like to encourage others to participate, either as committee members or as part of a rapid response network (see second point below.) They hope to do the following:

- Maintain contact with local government and law enforcement officials to receive notice of impending raids.
- Build a network of contacts throughout the community of people to be called on short notice to witness or document any deportation efforts by ICE or attend hearings of those in our community who are threatened with deportation or incarceration.
- Create a text message/ phone tree method to facilitate rapid contact.
- Investigate the kinds of rapid response mobilization efforts undertaken in other communities.

"The Sandwich Shop"

By Her Majesty Queen Rania Al Abdullah with Kelly DiPucchio Illustrated by Tricia Tusa

"This engaging title reminds children that having the courage to try new things can result in positive experiences."
