Friends in Christ:

The old Congregational *Pilgrim Hymnal* has a version of Alfred, Lord Tennyson's poem for the New Year, "Ring Out, Wild Bells." It's set to the tune DEUS TUORUM MILITUM (which roughly translates as "The God of Your Soldiers). This hymn is not in our hymnal, but maybe we should find some occasion to sing "Ring out the old, ring the new...Ring out the false, ring in the true," in these times when as the *New York Times* reported, "In [President Trump's] first 10 months in office, he has told 103 separate untruths, many of them repeatedly. Obama told 18 over his entire eight-year tenure. That's an average of about two a year for Obama and about 124 a year for Trump."

Maybe we should find some occasion to sing "Ring out false pride in place and blood, The civic slander and the spite" in these days when we have seen a rise in violent white nationalism.

May we should find some occasion to sing, "Ring out the feud of rich and poor; Ring in redress to all," in these days when we are seeing growing income inequality in our nation and in the world.

Maybe we should find some occasion to sing "Ring in the valiant...the larger heart, the kinder hand...Ring in the love of truth and right; Ring in the common love of good."

Or, maybe, we sing this hymn, we ring out those bells in many ways throughout the year. When we bear honest witness to the world as it is, we ring in the true. When we welcome refugees and support immigrants in their new lives, when we proclaim that each person and all people are created in the image of God, we ring out false pride. When we support the ongoing work of the Center for Worker Justice, we ring out the feud of rich and poor. When we feed the hungry, shelter the homeless, provide relief for victims of disaster we ring in the common love of good.

The light shines in the darkness. Hope rises from despair. A new year begins.

Ring out the old. Ring in the new. Ring out your own wild bells.

SHELTER HOUSE BOOK SALE—MARCH 24-25

The annual Shelter House book sale will be March 24-25. The sale will be at the Johnson County Fairgrounds, and virtually all of the preparation for the sale will be in March. Set up will be March 18-23, all hands on deck every day.

What you can do before March:

- 1) Identify books to donate, store them in your home and be prepared to move them to the sale site late February. Books can get dropped off at the Fairgrounds beginning February 26. Volunteers will be needed to sort or move boxes February 26-March 16: Monday, Wednesday and Saturday
- 2) Plan to donate time in March. We will need people to move boxes, sort books into subject categories, box books, etc. A sign-up sheet will be in Rockwood Hall and you can begin to consider how you might assist.
- 3) We will need lots of dollies to transport book boxes. If you have a dolly that you would be able to loan this enterprise for the month of March, please let the church office know.

The sale is a full community effort, with very strong support from the area churches. Last year our church was exceptional in its generosity of volunteer hours and book donations. Let's beat our 2017 record.

CRISIS CENTER NEWS

Alexandria worked at the front desk of the emergency room at Mercy Hospital for 11 years before she was diagnosed with kidney failure, hypertension, and heart blockage in March 2017. Her doctor encouraged her to seek out a less stressful job, so she started taking medical office professional certificate classes at Kirkwood in Iowa City. Alexandria pulled out all of the money she saved in her 401(k) in order to complete her education. She attends classes for four hours a day, four days a week, and works part-time for Iowa City.

In October, her savings ran out and she couldn't pay rent. Alexandria has been self-sufficient for years, so asking for help is very difficult. One day in class, Alexandria was thinking about being evicted, which brought her to tears. Her teacher noticed and encouraged her to write a letter seeking help from local churches and nonprofits. The Crisis Center provided her \$100 in rent assistance through the Emergency Assistance Program.

Alexandria is still facing serious financial and health challenges, but she is preparing to finish her certificate in December 2017 and is currently applying to jobs in the area and has heard back from several employers.

Our support helps people like Alexandria feed their children, keep their lights on, and avoid homelessness. Please keep the Crisis Center and its clients in your prayers.

GUIDELINES FOR PURCHASING NEW LIBRARY BOOKS FOR THE CONGREGATIONAL UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST

All church members have the opportunity to submit a book or periodical title for purchase consideration. The following criteria are suggested for selecting an appropriate book or periodical:

It contains a Christian message or moral teaching

It could be a spark for a discussion of Christian beliefs

It could explore other religions

It would offer ideas for coping with social situations as Christians

It is biographical in nature.

The CUCC Library committee of three volunteers is responsible for the purchase of books, periodicals and supplies for the library. The Committee will submit a list of newly purchased titles to the CE Board quarterly.

Book titles may be recommended by any member of the church using a simple request form. (see below) The forms will be available on the Rockwood Hall Library shelf and in the church library. The Library Committee will determine if the request fits the criteria listed on the request form, and if acceptable, will purchase the recommended book.

If there is a question about the suitability of a donated or recommended book for the library, the CE Board will have final say over adding the book to the stacks.

"Tears We Cannot Stop, a Sermon to White America"

By Michael Eric Dyson

Quoted from book cover:

"As the country grapples with racial division at a level not seen since the 1960's, one man's voice is heard above the rest. In his New York Times op-ed piece 'Death in Black and White', Michael Eric Dyson moved a nation. Now he continues to speak out in 'Tears We Cannot Stop' - a provocative and deeply personal call for change.

Dyson argues that if we are to make real racial progress we must face difficult truths, including being honest about how black grievance has been ignored, dismissed, or discounted.....Short, emotional, literary, powerful--this is the book that all Americans who care about the current and long-burning crisis in race relations will want to read."

Ebony magazine named him one of the 100 most influential African Americans and one of the 150 most powerful blacks in the nation. Dr. Dyson is the author of 19 books.
