Friends in Christ—

We had a joy-filled time of worship on the last Sunday in August when eight youth were confirmed and received as full members of our congregation.

In preparation for that worship service I turned to an unlikely place for inspiration—our church constitution. Much of that document deals with church boards and officers. But the first page gives voice to our mission, our covenant, and our faith. Central to who we are is the respect we have for each person's search for an understanding of the Christian faith and its meaning for our lives and for the issues of today. With strong words we state that we are an Open and Affirming congregation, welcoming all people into full membership and participation.

And we also affirm the responsibility of the Church in each generation to make the faith of the historic church its own.

In the year ahead we will celebrate the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of this beloved old building. We will publish a church history that looks at our last fifty years. These are not exercises in nostalgia but rather a part of discovering the kind of congregation we want to be in the future. We have a past, but we don't live in it.

A place like this doesn't just happen. I heard the Iowa entrepreneur Adam Pollock say something amazing recently: "People who show up and are willing to give their time will shape what the future's going to look like. If you want it to look a certain way, you should probably show up and give your energy to it." If this is true for a business, it's certainly true for a church like this.

These are the days to give shape to our future, to make faith our own.

#### **SERVING THE CHURCH**

Every year in January a slate of new members for the various church boards is presented to the congregation for approval. Work to prepare this slate occurs throughout the fall and is managed by the two Council Members At Large, Donna Hirst and Joyce Myer.

This work is now underway, and **we would like to invite all members of the congregation to consider serving on a Board**. Serving on a board is an excellent way to develop close working relations with other members of the church. Many of my dearest friendships developed while serving on church boards together. What is involved in serving on a Board?

Each of the six church Boards meet monthly, often on a weekday evening. Each of the boards has different responsibilities, and thus the tasks undertaken by each board are different. For example, the Membership Board plans the church picnic and other fellowship events; the Trustees provide oversight of the church budget and the building.

#### What is Mental Health First Aid?

The Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) program is an interactive 8-hour certification class that introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds understanding of their impact, and overviews common treatments.

Specifically, participants learn:

- The potential risk factors and warning signs for a range of mental health problems, including: depression, anxiety/trauma, psychosis and psychotic disorders, eating disorders, substance use disorders, and self-injury,
- An understanding of the prevalence of various mental health disorders in the U.S. and the need for reduced stigma in their communities,
- A 5-step action plan encompassing the skills, resources and knowledge to assess the situation, to select and implement appropriate interventions, and to help the individual in crisis connect with appropriate professional care,
- The appropriate professional, peer, social, and self-help resources available to help someone with a mental health problem.
- Similar to CPR, you will become certified as a Mental Health First Aider.



#### Dear Friends;

It's time to make plans to attend Sunday School beginning on September 10<sup>th</sup>! Children ages 4 years to 4<sup>th</sup> grade are encouraged to be a part of an exciting program every Sunday at 9:15 a.m. By "exciting" I mean that there will be interesting, creative and learning opportunities every week!

The 10<sup>th</sup> will kick off with a continental breakfast for the children in the upstairs Yellow Room. Then we will think about Moses' Creation Story from the book of Genesis with each child using a "beach ball" globe to add God's daily creative forms. ## "The Promise; the True Story of a Family in the Holocaust" By Eva Schloss and Barbara Powers

"Eva was a little Jewish girl during the Second World War. She lived happily with her mother and father and older brother, Heinz, in the beautiful city of Vienna. But when the Nazis came everything changed."

"Eva's family fled to Amsterdam. Eventually they had no choice but to go into hiding. Despite the increasing terror, they cherished their precious moments together."

This is the unforgettable story of how Eva and Heinz lived each day to the full while struggling to survive in a world turned upside down.

Eva Geiringer and her mother were separated from Heinz and her father in Holland. Heinz and his father Erich did not survive the Holocaust but Eva and her mother did. Heinz enjoyed painting and some of his art work that he hid during the Holocaust was later retrieved. Eva's mother later met and married Otto Frank, father of Anne Frank. Eva Schloss is the step-daughter of Otto Frank.
