Friends in Christ:

Lent begins early this year, on February 14. Ash Wednesday does not often fall on Valentine's Day. When it does, we have the opportunity to see once more the connection of ashes to love, the connection of ashes to hearts, and especially the connection of ashes to our broken hearts.

The connection of ashes to sorrow for sin is a familiar part of the beginning of Lent. For millennia ashes have been used as a sign of repentance. Even more, however, ashes are a physical reminder of our mortality. We receive them with the words: "Remember you are dust and to dust you shall return."

The greater emphasis is on neither sin nor mortality but on the love that God has for us. With the ashes of the beginning of Lent we get at renewed sense of the love that the Creator has for all creation, including those of us who are created in God's very image. Reminded of our mortality and our finitude, we are also reminded of God's love that is with us in both our living and our dying. Dust we may be. But nothing can separate us from the sustaining love of God.

With this awareness newly fresh in our hearts, we are also called once again to look at and enter into the broken places in our lives and in our world. On the Sundays in Lent we will explore what we discover "...in the Broken Places" of our lives. We will begin this exploration on Ash Wednesday as we consider our brokenhearted condition as those who know grief, sorrow, pain, regret, and fear.

Throughout Lent members are invited to bring some broken object to church to be used in developing a new art work. Connie Schumm and other visual artists will take our broken objects, symbols of our broken lives and create something new from them.

Join us on Ash Wednesday, February 14 and on the Sundays in Lent as we enter the broken places and find God there to heal, to restore, to strengthen, and to make new.

SHELTER HOUSE BOOK SALE—MARCH 24-25

The annual Shelter House book sale will be March 24-25. The sale will be at the Johnson County Fairgrounds, and virtually all of the preparation for the sale will be in March. Set up will be March 18-23, all hands on deck every day.

What you can do before March:

- Identify books to donate, store them in your home and be prepared to move them to the sale site late February. Books can get dropped off at the Fairgrounds beginning February 26. Volunteers will be needed to sort or move boxes February 26-March 16: Monday, Wednesday and Saturday
- 2) Plan to donate time in March. We will need people to move boxes, sort books into subject categories, box books, etc. A sign-up sheet will be in Rockwood Hall and you can begin to consider how you might assist.
- 3) We will need lots of dollies to transport book boxes. If you have a dolly that you would be able to loan this enterprise for the month of March, please let the church office know.

The sale is a full community effort, with very strong support from the area churches. Last year our church was exceptional in its generosity of volunteer hours and book donations. Let's beat our 2017 record.

CRISIS CENTER UPDATE

Since Dec. 1, The Crisis Center's Emergency Assistance Program has completed 40 housing and utility assists for those in our community. Of those, seven were for rent/deposits for new housing, 8 were electric bills, and 25 were assists on water bills.

In 2017 Congregational UCC gave \$4000 to support this work through the Common Fund. Thanks again for your support.

When Elenzie arrived in Iowa City, he was homeless and seeking a job. A local restaurant offered him a job yet, he was unable to find regular transportation and purchase the required uniform. He reached out to The Crisis Center for help. Volunteers and staff were able to provide him a 20-ride bus pass and a \$100 Crowded Closet voucher so he could buy the clothes he needed to get started.

After a few weeks on the job, The Crisis Center helped him pay the security deposit for an apartment and the last \$100 on his rent for the month of December. Although he could only afford an air mattress to furnish his new place when he first moved in, he was thankful to finally have a place to stay. Elenzie had this to say about The Crisis Center:

"I found a job on my own but I give credit to The Crisis Center because they're not only there for resources. They're in-house help. Even when you're having stress or having problems that you can't control or handle, and after you speak to your higher power about it... Okay, your life still continues. The Crisis Center is here to listen. And believe it or not, without a person there to care and listen, you won't even begin to start your journey."

UCCIC LENT ART PROJECT

Broken things put together in a new way can be more beautiful and powerful than they were before breaking. Kintsugi, the Japanese method of repairing broken ceramics with a lacquer mixed with gold, silver or platinum dust, emphasizes and celebrates scars. Some kintsugi pots are incredibly valuable. In the past I've used these ideas to make mosaic pieces using shards of pottery and broken mirrors.

Assemblage is a similar form or medium very much like mosaic or collage, but three dimensional. I propose that everyone bring at least one item to contribute to piece demonstrating how all our imperfect selves combine to make something beautiful. Pretty good congregational metaphor there in cased you missed it. Your contribution may be something broken, a dish or piece of jewelry, a rock, a handful of sea glass, some thumbtacks, a collection of washers from that coffee can in the garage, a chewed up pencil from the bottom of your junk drawer - pretty much anything (in the case of some uglier bits be warned that I plan to employ gold spray paint!) Nothing too big please. And nothing ephemeral, like leaves or feathers, or wobbly like rubber bands. Just bring plenty.

The size of this piece will depend entirely on what is contributed. I am 100% certain we can make it all into something gorgeous. Once the bits are all in one place, there will be sorting, conceptualizing, placing and a lot of gluing, probably onto a sheet of plywood, or maybe glass. Then, depending on how the concept has come together, maybe clear resin to embed it.

I will be working on this piece at the church during Lent and would love to have anyone who's interested come by and help with sorting, brainstorming and gluing. Let me know and we'll find a time that works. Look for the collection box in Rockwood Hall!

GUIDELINES FOR PURCHASING NEW LIBRARY BOOKS FOR THE CONGREGATIONAL UNITED CHURCH OF CHRIST

All church members have the opportunity to submit a book or periodical title for purchase consideration. The following criteria are suggested for selecting an appropriate book or periodical:

It contains a Christian message or moral teaching

It could be a spark for a discussion of Christian beliefs

It could explore other religions

It would offer ideas for coping with social situations as Christians

It is biographical in nature.

The CUCC Library committee of three volunteers is responsible for the purchase of books, periodicals and supplies for the library. The Committee will submit a list of newly purchased titles to the CE Board quarterly.

Book titles may be recommended by any member of the church using a simple request form. (see below) The forms will be available on the Rockwood Hall Library shelf and in the church library. The Library Committee will determine if the request fits the criteria listed on the request form, and if acceptable, will purchase the recommended book.

If there is a question about the suitability of a donated or recommended book for the library, the CE Board will have final say over adding the book to the stacks.

Our Children's Library

"The World Jesus Knew: A Curious Kid's Guide to Life in the First Century"

Author: Marc Olson Illustrator: Jem Maybank

We live several centuries after Jesus and often have questions as we read the Bible about the area in which Jesus lived, and details about daily life in those times. Centuries of scholarship in the history, archaeology, and sociology have provided some tools to give answers to some of our questions about the Middle East – also called The Ho-ly Land.

This attractive book contains maps, charts, graphs, interesting illustrations and text that is scattered in a readerfriendly format. Topics covered are: The Structure of Society; What Grows There? The Jewish People; Roman Rules and Their Army; Crime and Punishment; Getting Around; Home Life; Getting Dressed; The Working Life; Fishing in the Sea of Galilee; The Vineyard; Agriculture; Olives and Their Oil; The Life of a Woman; The Jewish Calendar; The Sanhedrin; The Jerusalem Temple; Crucifixion; Death and Burial, Illness and Medicine; Magic and Miracles; and a chapter on Jesus, His Words, His World.

The author, Marc Olson, is a theologian and a former pastor. He earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts from Pacific Lutheran University, and a Master of Divinity from Luther Seminary. He was awarded the Seminary's International Preaching Fellowship in 2007, which resulted in a year abroad, studying and teaching with his family in Tanzania, Israel, and Palestine.

This new book will be catalogued in the church library under "REF" for "Reference", but you will probably find it in the Sunday school classrooms.
