Friends in Christ:

As you know, this year we celebrate Easter on April 1, a day associated with folly and frivolity, with jokes and jests.

In some ways the mood is a radical departure from Lent at Congregational UCC this year. During the days of Lent we engaged in the vulnerable work of opening ourselves to the broken places in our lives and in our world.

We brought broken items large and small, things that don't work, things that are damaged and shattered—symbols, perhaps of our own lives. Led by Connie Schumm, members have transformed these items into a stunning visual work of art that expresses both brokenness and healing.

We gathered before worship to talk about illness and separation and trauma and death—not easy topics for a Sunday morning. And as we talked about these things, we also found ourselves talking about healing and restoration and renewal and what might even be called the power of the resurrection.

We've gathered in the sanctuary to listen as scripture told about being alone in broken places, being judged in broken places. And as we listened we also heard that we are together in broken places, that we receive and give compassion in broken places, and that we even found a sense of generosity and joy in those places.

As Easter dawns, we find ourselves and our world still broken and at the same time called to a new wholeness.

Dr. Paul Brand is a hand surgeon, and as such is familiar with the delicate structure of the hand and the damage that can come to it. Reflecting on the resurrection, he writes: "One of the things I find most astonishing is that, though we think of the future life as something perfected, when the risen Christ appeared to his disciples, he said, 'Come and look at my hands.' Why did he want to keep the wounds of his humanity? Wasn't it because he wanted to carry back with him an eternal reminder of the sufferings of those on earth? He carried the marks of his suffering so he could continue to understand the needs of those suffering. He wanted to be forever one with us."

The risen Christ is still the wounded Christ.

As Easter people, we are still wounded people.

Even so, we celebrate, we give thanks, we rejoice. Traditionally the season of Easter extends for seven weeks. This year we begin our rejoicing on April 1and maybe that can help us understand both our brokenness and the new life of the resurrection.

For centuries in Europe, the time following Easter Sunday was observed by the faithful as "days of joy and laughter" with parties and picnics to celebrate Jesus' resurrection. Churchgoers and pastors played practical jokes on each other, drenched each other with water, told jokes, sang, and danced. The custom was rooted in the musings of early church theologians (such Augustine, Gregory of Nyssa, and John Chrysostom) that God played a practical joke on the devil by raising Jesus from the dead. "*Risus paschalis* - the Easter laugh," the early theologians called it.

Limping and laughing, we great the dawn of a new day.

JOHNSON COUNTY CROP WALK - SUNDAY, APRIL 8

The Crisis Center of Johnston County got a big boost in its fight against hunger from the 2017 CROP Hunger Walk with a donation of almost \$7000 for those in our community who are food insecure. And the CROP Hunger Walk hopes to raise even more this year in April.

Because of the generosity of the supporters of the Johnston County CROP Hunger Walk and other funding sources, neighbors could visit the Johnson County Food Bank more frequently than ever in a calendar year: 52,703 visits total. During those 52,703 visits, 12,590 people received nearly 1.6 million pounds of food from the Food Bank, which was the most ever distributed. Surprisingly, 41% of the people served were under 18; almost half were minors in need of meals. Over half, 54%, of the families served had at least one working adult.

CROP Hunger Walk: A National Movement

CROP Hunger Walks are community-wide events sponsored by Church World Service, an organization fighting hunger since the end of World War II. Participants include members of religious organizations, businesses, schools and others to raise funds to end hunger in the United States and around the world. Twenty-five percent of the money raised during the local walk stays in the community to combat hunger. In 2017, 906 CROP Hunger Walks were held nationwide. This year's participants raised about \$9,100,000, roughly a quarter of which supported 1,572 food banks, homeless shelters, soup kitchens and more in the U.S (https://cwsannualreport.org/north-america/crop-hunger-walk/).

How can you help? For the upcoming CROP Hunger Walk, there will be two Open Houses to collect your donation envelopes and educational materials: Zion Lutheran Church @310 North Johnson Street and Christ the King @ 325 Mormon Trek Boulevard. Both will be open from 4:00 – 6:00 pm on Tuesday February 27th. The 2018 Johnson County CROP Hunger Walk will be on Sunday April 8th, at 1:30pm beginning in the dining room at the 1105 Project, 1105 Gilbert Court, next door to the Crisis Center. NEWS FROM THE COMMON FUND

In February, the Common Fund's contributions to the Emergency Assistance Program provided 19 housing and utility assists for those in our community. Of those, 5 were for rent/deposits for new housing, 5 were electric bills, and 9 were water bills. Through money budgeted in our General Fund, Congregational UCC will give \$2,000 to the Common Fund this year.

Here's one story about the difference our giving makes:

VeVe is a single mom that has not been able to work for the past few months due to serious health issues. Because of this, she fell behind on her water bill while trying to afford rent, electricity and food for her family. Money from the CRC's Common Fund was used to get the bill paid in full and enabled VeVe to get caught up on her bills. The Crisis Center also worked with VeVe to get her late fee waived, greatly reducing her past due amount.

VeVe says her daughters have been working hard to help her around the house while she's been sick. For her, she says, her family's well-being is the most important thing. "Every day I'm with my daughters is a good day. If we're together, they make me fight, they motivate me. For me that's the greatest motivation that I need; the love for my girls."

THE SENTENCING PROJECT CONCERT

The Sentencing Project, which compiles state-level criminal justice data from a variety of sources, tells us that the racial disparity in incarceration rates for black and white U.S. residents in the state of Iowa is 11.1:1 - a statistic that should give all of us pause. As an extension of our growing understanding of the issues related to race and mass incarceration and our study of *The New Jim Crow*, a group from the church plans to attend the Oakdale Community Choir concert on April 28th at 1:30 PM at Oakdale Prison. Nearly every week since 2009, around 30 inmates (the Inside Singers) and 30 outside volunteers (the Outside Singers) compose original songs, share written reflections, and perform together as the Oakdale Community Choir at Oakdale Prison for incarcerated audiences and outside guests. We encourage those in our church who are interested in music and/or racial justice and the prison system in Iowa to join us as we attend the concert at Oakdale Prison. "Grit and Grace: Heroic Women of the Bible"

Preteen girls and boys will find our new book interesting and thought-provoking. It contains creative first-person retellings of the stories of eighteen women. Some of these women are barely mentioned in the Bible, but God worked through them as he does with people today. These are some of the super-heroes of the Bible!

After a powerful foreword by Sarah Bessey and a moving introduction by the author, the reader encounters stories of imperfect, brave, and extraordinary women. We are reminded that there are still strong, smart, feisty, and determined women in our world who are doing God's work. It is hoped that these stories will help young people realize that their life matters.

The author, Caryn Rivadeneira, is on the worship staff of Elmhurst Christian Reformed Church and lives in a Chicago suburb. She is the author of seven books – for children and adults. In her Introduction she says, "My favorite thing about the Bible is that God gave it to us to be wrestled with and wondered about."

Rivadeneira included things in each chapter to help readers think about what they have read: (1) Fast Facts – tidbits to help you look at some of the issues these women faced; (2) Think About It – Questions to reflect upon after reading; (3) Get the Full Story – References to the Bible to read what those writers said about these women; (4) Prayer Prompt – Something for the reader to talk to God about.




"Sarah's gift to us is not that she answers all the questions. It is that she tells us the truth. She writes about the stories we are told to hide."

By Simon Fitzmaurice



Please arrive one-half hour before the service, which begins at 10:15 am.


