Friends in Christ—

This year March takes us all the way to the end of Lent, as Easter is Sunday, April 1. During this month of longer days and (we hope) warmer temperatures, our bodies have the opportunity to relax a little. We've made it through the cold and snow; we've avoided or overcome the colds and flu. With mud and rain, spring summons us to new life.

At the same time, we continue to explore what it means to be "in the broken places" this Lent. Through conversations and worship and art we keep daring to look at those places and situations, the institutions and relationships that are in some way shattered and in need of repair. At a recent adult education session, we discovered that it can help to consider our contributions to our congregation-wide art project—those broken items, those things that don't work, those things that can't or won't be used again—as a way to reflect on this broken world.

What we find in the broken places is not always what we would expect. We find isolation *and* community. We find judgment *and* forgiveness. We find sorrow *and* joy. As we look and listen, we even find God present in new and surprising ways.

Yes, there is more - much more - to life than our brokenness and the brokenness of this world. But sometimes when we look in those places we can better see the healing, the abundance, and the wholeness that surrounds us. Lent gives us that opportunity. We look at who we are. And in the final week of Lent, this year the final week of March, we look closely at Jesus who broke bread and who was himself broken.

And in doing so we might better see the light of resurrection on Easter and better hear the good news that Christ is risen and calls us into new life.

On Palm Sunday, March 25, we will dedicate our One Great Hour of Sharing (OGHS) offering. This offering has long been an important part of the life of our congregation.

One Great Hour is a Christian effort to empower, provide water, supply food, and give relief from disasters. It began in the Episcopal Church in 1946 when a goal of one million dollars per year was set for World Relief. That year members were challenged to raise "one million dollars in one hour." SHELTER HOUSE BOOK SALE - MARCH 24-25

The annual Shelter House book sale will be March 24-25. The sale will be at the Johnson County Fairgrounds, and virtually all of the preparation for the sale will be in March. Set-up will be March 18-23, all hands on deck every day.

What you can do before March:

- 1) Identify books to donate, store them in your home and be prepared to move them to the sale site late February. Books can get dropped off at the Fairgrounds beginning February 26. Volunteers will be needed to sort or move boxes February 26-March 16: Monday, Wednesday and Saturday
- 2) Plan to donate time in March. We will need people to move boxes, sort books into subject categories, box books, etc. A sign-up sheet will be in Rockwood Hall and you can begin to consider how you might assist.
- 3) We will need lots of dollies to transport book boxes. If you have a dolly that you would be able to loan this enterprise for the month of March, please let the church office know.

The sale is a full community effort, with very strong support from the area churches. Last year our church was exceptional in its generosity of volunteer hours and book donations. Let's beat our 2017 record.

CRISIS CENTER UPDATE

Since Dec. 1, The Crisis Center's Emergency Assistance Program has completed 40 housing and utility assists for those in our community. Of those, seven were for rent/deposits for new housing, 8 were electric bills, and 25 were assists on water bills.

In 2017 Congregational UCC gave \$4000 to support this work through the Common Fund. Thanks again for your support.

When Elenzie arrived in Iowa City, he was homeless and seeking a job. A local restaurant offered him a job, yet he was unable to find regular transportation and purchase the required uniform. He reached out to The Crisis Center for help. Volunteers and staff were able to provide him a 20-ride bus pass and a \$100 Crowded Closet voucher so he could buy the clothes he needed to get started.

After a few weeks on the job, The Crisis Center helped him pay the security deposit for an apartment and the last \$100 on his rent for the month of December. Although he could only afford an air mattress to furnish his new place when he first moved in, he was thankful to finally have a place to stay. Elenzie had this to say about The Crisis Center:

"I found a job on my own but I give credit to The Crisis Center because they're not only there for resources. They're in-house help. Even when you're having stress or having problems that you can't control or handle, and after you speak to your higher power about it... Okay, your life still continues. The Crisis Center is here to listen. And believe it or not, without a person there to care and listen, you won't even begin to start your journey."

ADULT VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR LITTLE CREATIONS DAYCARE

Little Creations Academy, Inc., the licensed daycare center of the New Creations International Church, 2929 East Court Street, Iowa City, has a need for adult volunteers to fill three openings on Monday through Friday, working with paid staff members Two volunteers will be utilized for the preschool classroom (one at 9am-1pm; the other at 1pm-4pm). The third volunteer would work from 12pm-3pm, floating to provide breaks for other staff members. Volunteers' schedules can be arranged to allow sharing of these positions. Classroom volunteers will not be the primary care providers. They will work alongside the teachers and help with basic care of the children (e.g. hand washing, prepping for and cleaning up after activities, helping to serve and clean-up after meals, and overall supervision of the children) in the classroom they are in. Lesson plans and activities will be determined by paid staff. Volunteers won't be responsible for any diapering. Little Creations Academy requires volunteers to have a state background check and doesn't require volunteers to have experience working with children.

Volunteers may qualify for compensation via the Foster Grandparents (FG) program. Foster Grandparents are volunteers ages 55 or older who serve 15 to 40 hours per week in parochial schools, daycares, or community centers. Foster Grandparents may be eligible for a tax-free stipend to supplement income, as well receiving transportation or travel reimbursement. In Johnson County, contact Julie Lefebure (563-580-0458 or, jlefebure@uwiservice.org) about this program. The FG program would cover all costs related to the background check.

For volunteers not participating in the FG program, Little Creations Academy will cover the costs related to the background check. UCCIC LENT ART PROJECT

Broken things put together in a new way can be more beautiful and powerful than they were before breaking. Kintsugi, the Japanese method of repairing broken ceramics with a lacquer mixed with gold, silver or platinum dust, emphasizes and celebrates scars. Some kintsugi pots are incredibly valuable. In the past I've used these ideas to make mosaic pieces using shards of pottery and broken mirrors.

Assemblage is a similar form or medium very much like mosaic or collage, but three dimensional. I propose that everyone bring at least one item to contribute to piece demonstrating how all our imperfect selves combine to make something beautiful. Pretty good congregational metaphor there in cased you missed it. Your contribution may be something broken, a dish or piece of jewelry, a rock, a handful of sea glass, some thumbtacks, a collection of washers from that coffee can in the garage, a chewed up pencil from the bottom of your junk drawer - pretty much anything (in the case of some uglier bits be warned that I plan to employ gold spray paint!) Nothing too big please. And nothing ephemeral, like leaves or feathers, or wobbly like rubber bands. Just bring plenty.

The size of this piece will depend entirely on what is contributed. I am 100% certain we can make it all into something gorgeous. Once the bits are all in one place, there will be sorting, conceptualizing, placing and a lot of gluing, probably onto a sheet of plywood, or maybe glass. Then, depending on how the concept has come together, maybe clear resin to embed it.

I will be working on this piece at the church during Lent and would love to have anyone who's interested come by and help with sorting, brainstorming and gluing. Let me know and we'll find a time that works. Look for the collection box in Rockwood Hall!

"Psalms for Young Children"

The adults in our church have a packet of Lenten devotions to read and ponder during Lent. This 2008 book for children is new to our collection of children's books. It contains paraphrases of psalms in language appropriate for young readers. They express feelings familiar to children: fear, uncertainty, comfort, contentment, amazement, and gratitude. The 38 psalms could be used singly in the same way that adults read their daily Lenten devotion.

The font is large and easily readable. The paintings of exotic settings with bold outlines and rich colors feature children in the natural world. The book received The Association of Theological Booksellers "Theologos Award for Best Children's Book" in 2008. It is catalogued in the children's section of the church library under "Old Testament," but will be displayed in Rockwood Hall during March when it is not being used.



By G. Willow Wilson

"The butterfly Mosque" is American writer and journalist G. Willow Wilson's remarkable story of converting to Islam and falling in love with an Egyptian man in a volatile post-9/11 world.

Inspired by her experience during a college Islamic Studies course, Wilson, who was raised an atheist, decides to risk everything to convert to Islam and embark on a fated journey across continents and into an uncertain future.
