Each generation of stewards of this building have cared for it, used it, and changed it in order for it to be of service to the needs of both the current and future members. PENTECOST IS SUNDAY, MAY 20



From the minutes of October 3, 1866, of the Congregational Society of Iowa City:

Our interests as a society demand that we make immediate efforts forward building a house of worship next season.

From The Iowa City Republican, January 2, 1867:

The Congregational Society has purchased the lot on the corner of Clinton and Jefferson Streets.

- The laying of the cornerstone June 9, 1868.
- The Congregational building is under roof and secure and ready for the 148 foot spire. (Weather permitting) November 4, 1868.
- Church dedicated on December 19, 1869

POOR PEOPLE'S CAMPAIGN - A NATIONAL CALL FOR MORAL REVIVAL

As we face the interconnected evils of systemic racism, poverty, the war economy, and ecological devastation, there is a chance to come together to lift impacted voices and work together for change.

Along with over 30 states, the Iowa Poor People's Campaign is planning a public rally in Des Moines on Monday, May 14th at 2:00-3:00 p.m. And they are holding Nonviolent Moral Fusion Direct Action Trainings to prepare for that rally.

These trainings will include:

- An overview of the history and principles of the Poor People's Campaign: A National Call for Moral Revival Simple and fun songs
- Stories and testimonies from folks around the state impacted by systemic racism, poverty, the war economy, and ecological devastation
- PPC's commitment to nonviolence and why that's an essential commitment for all those wishing to join in the actions
- Childcare if needed; they are also hoping to help with transportation if needed (but can't guarantee it)

CRISIS CENTER: FASTING ON THE 21ST

The average cost of a low-income meal is \$2.36. The average SNAP (food stamp) recipient's benefits cover only \$1.86 of each meal.

In other words, **food stamps cover about 21 days of food each month** before they run out completely, leaving individuals and families to stretch their resources to the max until the first of the next month. Without resources like the food bank, many low-income families would be without enough food in their cupboards to feed their families for over a week.

The Crisis Center is encouraging the community to give up a meal on May 21st and set up a sustainable, monthly donation of \$21. Check the box next to *Show my support by making this a recurring donation* and enter your payment details to set up a secure monthly gift of \$21: enough to cover 2.5 families' food bank visits and get them through their time of need. Our Children's Library "Who Counts? 100 Sheep, 10 Coins, and 2 Sons"

<u>Who Counts?</u> is a recent addition to our church library. It is a contemporary retelling of the three Biblical parables with numerical themes: the good shepherd, the lost coin, and the prodigal son. The culturally diverse characters and present-day settings will be appealing to young children, and adults will appreciate the notes for parents and teachers in the back of the book. The authors give some background on the Christian tradition regarding the stories which focus on repenting and forgiving. Levine and Sasso do not intend to erase those traditions, but "seek to add a new understanding based on what we imagine Jesus' original audiences would have heard. That audience would not think that the man who lost his sheep, the woman who lost her coin, or the father who lost his older son were symbols for God. This is because God doesn't lose us. Nor would they think of the sheep and the coin as examples of repentance, because sheep and coins don't repent…In our reading, the three stories are connected. The first two stories set up the third. The main message is about counting, searching for what is missing, and celebrating becoming whole again."

Levine and Sasso suggest to parents and teachers that when we adults read parables we should ask ourselves these questions: "Where am I in the story? How am I like the man who lost his sheep, the woman who lost her coin, the father who feels he may have lost both his sons? Do I ever feel like the lost one? How am I like the younger brother who does not want to stay home? How am I like the older brother who does everything his father tells him but who does not feel that he is loved? Have I lost something, or someone, and not paid attention? Is there someone I take for granted? What, or whom, have I forgotten to count?"



"On August 11, 2011, Caroline Found, a 17-year-old all-state volleyball player, was tragically killed in a moped accident on her way to the University of Iowa hospital to visit her terminally ill mother, Ellyn.

Caroline's death and that of her mother twelve days later shocked her Iowa City community and devastated her father Ernie Found and siblings Gregg and Catharine. Equally affected were her Iowa City West volleyball teammates and coach Kathy Bresnahan, who were counting on "Line" to lead them in their quest to repeat as state champions.

Told in author Bresnahan's straightforward manner, "The Miracle Season" chronicles how "Coach Brez" and the West team attempt to overcome their collective grief while playing the game that serves as a daily reminder of their loss. As the team struggles to replace Line, we watch Coach Brez and her players attempt to move forward through the tears, laughter and memories of their fallen teammate.

Guided by the spirit of Line, the Women of Troy regroup and go on a late season run that leads to a dramatic finish in the state championship match.

Anyone who has struggled to overcome life's challenges will appreciate this story of strength, faith, perseverance and love."

Author Kathy Bresnahan was the varsity coach at Iowa City West High from 1987-2000 and 2005-2013. She currently lives in Iowa City.




