Friends in Christ:

The Rev. Russell Coats died last month. You didn't know him. He was the pastor of the Evangelical United Brethren church my family attended when I was a child in Peoria. And because I was only a child at the time, I don't have a lot of memories of Rev. Coats. Once, after he moved from the Peoria church, I ran into him at a church camp in the mid-sixties. He seemed both surprised and disappointed that I had "long" hair. (It really wasn't long then, but it would be later—although you wouldn't know that now.)

What I do remember is a children's sermon the Rev. Coats gave. He must have done this each Sunday, although I only recall one of them. He showed us the exoskeleton of a 13 year cicada that had recently emerged. It was fascinating. And I remember nothing else—no moral, no life-lesson, no religious insight.

I ponder this occasionally—when I'm writing a sermon, when I'm planning a conversation with the children of our congregation, and this time of year when the locusts/cicadas are chirping loudly. I don't know the "lesson" that we were supposed to learn that Sunday morning, but I know what I did learn: that all of the wondrous and mysterious creation had a place in the sanctuary of the church and in our worship of God; that children are an important part of a congregation; and that wonder and welcome are needed as much as if not more than morals and insights.

Preaching to adults and talking with children are part of my calling as a minister. They are also occasions of challenge and joy. I said to the recent new member class that this is a congregation that knows how to listen to sermons (the new members tended to agree with that) and that the listening you provide has been of great encouragement and help to me. We also have, as you have probably noticed, children who know how to talk and who are often quite ready to share their thoughts during the children's message. This, too, is both helpful and challenging!

I don't know what the youngest among us will remember in the coming years about our Sunday mornings in these days. But I hope that they take with them a sense of wonder and welcome from this place and share it in the world.

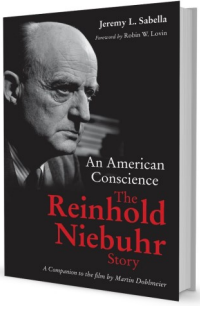

### SERVING THE CHURCH

Every year in January a slate of new members for the various church boards is presented to the congregation for approval. Work to prepare this slate occurs throughout the fall and is managed by the two Council Members At Large, Donna Hirst and Joyce Myer.

As an alternative to serving on a church board, you might serve as a special church representative.

### DR. IRA BYOCK CONTINUED

As one of the foremost palliative-care physicians in the country, Dr. Byock argues that how we die is among the biggest national crises facing us today. Byock's first book, *Dying Well*, (1997) has become a standard in the field of hospice and palliative care. *The Four Things That Matter Most*, (2004) is used as a counseling tool widely by palliative care and hospice programs, as well as within pastoral care. His most recent book, *The Best Care Possible* (March 2012) tackles the crisis that surrounds serious illness and dying in America and his quest to transform care through the end of life. It has been praised by the Wall Street Journal, the Economist and other major publications, and won the annual Books for a Better Life Award in the category of Wellness.

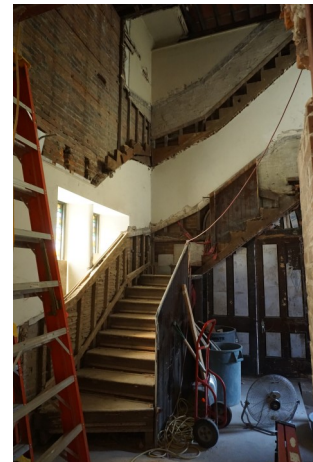
### GOING UP!!!!

### REFLECTIONS FROM A PASTORAL COUNSELOR....

In the movie THE HORSE WHISPERER Grace experiences a very serious accident while riding her horse Pilgrim. Annie, Grace's mother, learns there is this fellow, Tom Booker, who works with horses in a different manner. It's as if he whispers to them--and Annie decides she wants to utilize Tom for healing.

Tom's style is to offer an invitation to try to establish a relationship by communicating care and respect in the hope of creating trust. Because it is a duet, not a solo, a relationship requires a dual decision, a mutual commitment. And either party is free to withdraw.

Such an approach parallels God's style. While God wants to be in relationship with humanity, it is presented as an invitation--which includes the freedom to drop out--and is never forced upon us. With any relationship, if we choose to drop out, it is important to ask what will benefit/cost be of not continuing. Maybe God is the People Whisperer . . .

"As a naval officer, P.O.W., and one of America's most admired political leaders, John McCain has seen countless acts of bravery and self-sacrifice. Now, in this inspiring meditation on courage he shares his most cherished stories of ordinary individuals who have risked everything to defend the people and principles they hold most dear.

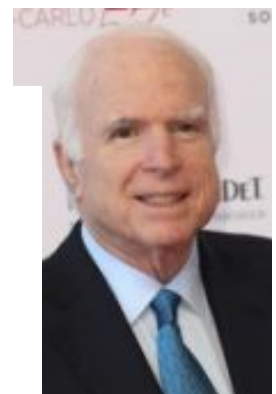
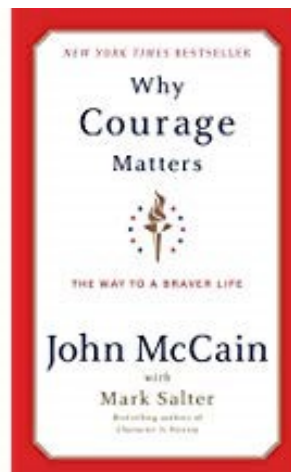
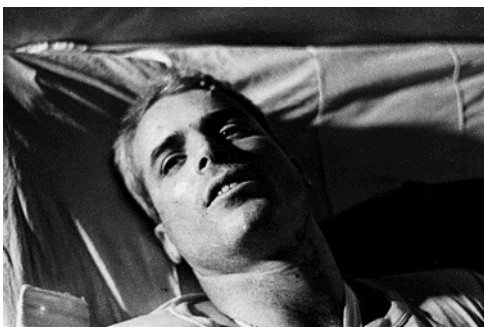
"Courage is not the absence of fear but the capacity for action despite our fears, McCain reminds us introducing the stories of figures both famous and obscure that he finds most compelling--Nobel Peace Prize laureate Aung San Suu Kyi, Sgt Roy Benavidez, 1960's civil rights leader John Lewis, and Hannah Senesh (Hungarian resistance).

"These are some of the examples McCain turns to for inspiration and offers to others to help them summon the resolve to be both good and great. He explains the value of courage in both everyday actions and extraordinary feats. We learn why moral principles and physical courage are often not distinct quantities but two sides of the same coin. Most of all, readers discover how sometimes simply setting the right example can be the ultimate act of courage."

After a career in the U.S. Navy (P.O.W Vietnam War) and two terms as U.S. representative, John McCain was first elected to the U.S. Senate (Arizona) in 1986 and was reelected five times.

McCain recently passed away in 2018.

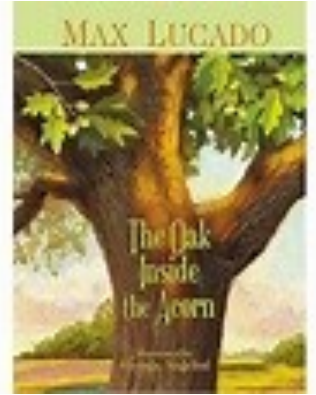

# Our Children's Library

The Oak Inside the Acorn by Max Lucado. Nashville, TN: Thomas Nelson, 2006. Ages 6-10 years, but the message is relevant for teens and adults.



The latest edition of this book was printed in 2011. Our church library copy was published earlier, but has not been featured thus far in a review. It is timely and appropriate for a couple of reasons. One is that we tend to be more aware of falling leaves and acorns in this autumn season. The book may be read simply as a story of the way an acorn might grow into a tree.

A larger message is the one the mother tree gave to the little acorn, “Just be the tree God made you to be.” From our early years we usually have a desire to be someone specific – a ballet dancer, a fireman, etc. Time and situations soon carry us from our safe zone. Teens often want to be all the things their friends are, but eventually discover they are unwilling or unable to copy the same path. They begin to discover their own skills, interests, and talents. God expands our understanding of the ways we can be the person God calls us to be. As we grow older we constantly find new ways to be “me.”

Max Lucado has authored several award-winning children's books, as well as books for teens and adults.

In 2006 he was serving as minister for the Oak Hills Church in San Antonio, Texas.

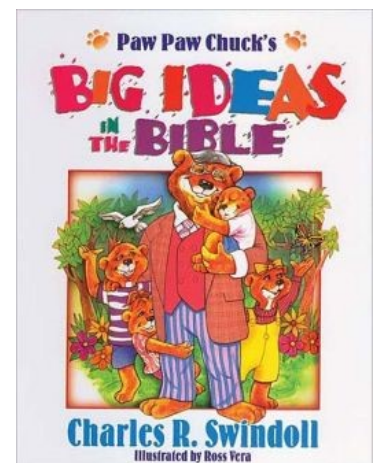
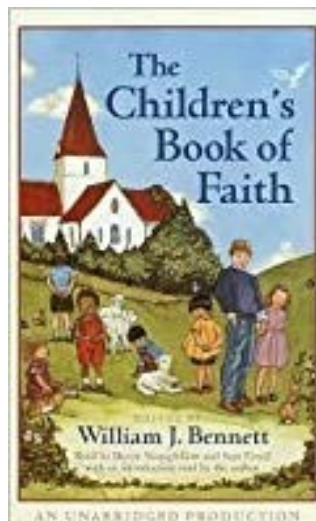
George Angelini has been creating illustrations for more than twenty-five years, and has won numerous awards for his work.
