Mariah Carey is once again telling us "All I Want for Christmas Is You"—which is presented as not asking too much, compared to all sorts of gifts around the tree, but, when you think about it, that's quite a request, isn't it?

Twenty years ago, the environmental activist, Bill McKibben, published a small book titled *Hundred Dollar Holiday: The Case for a More Joyful Christmas*. In it he says something that gets at the real issue: "Christmas should be something to enjoy rather than endure. Instead of an island of bustle, it should be an island of peace amid a busy life. We want so much more out of Christmas: more music, more companionship, more contemplation, more time outdoors, more love."

We want so much more.

We want so much more—not just out of Christmas, but out of life.

And that's something to accept, to embrace, to celebrate.

Recently in worship I asked the children of our church about the big things that they wanted. One girl said she wanted the earth to continue—a powerful answer, showing that even young people are aware the jeopardy in which we have put this planet.

The incarnational message of Christmas is that God loved this creation enough to come to us as one of us. That message calls us, even now, especially now to be stewards of creation. One of the traditional themes of Advent is the need to wake up and be alert. Recent UN and US reports of climate change come to us as a call to do the same—wake up and act while we still can.

During January and February, the Mission Board will offer a Sunday morning adult education series on climate change and our response—watch the Sunday bulletins and the January newsletter for more information.

Let us celebrate the joy and the hope of Christmas in every way possible—with more music, more companionship, more contemplation, more time outdoors, more love. And let us take the good news of God with us—Emmanuel—into the new year with new awareness and new action.

# THE SANCTUARY CHOIR OF THE CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH PRESENTS.....







The Sanctuary Choir of The Congregational Church, under the direction of Kristin Ramseyer presents *Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme*, BWV 140, by Johann Sebastian Bach during worship on **Sunday, December 9**.

Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme, BWV 140, is a sacred chorale cantata in the dramatic dialogue style written by J.S. Bach during his time as Kantor in Leipzig. The work is one of Bach's most popular and widely performed sacred cantatas. It was composed for the 27<sup>th</sup> Sunday after Trinity and first performed on November 25, 1731. The cantata is based on the hymn in three stanzas "Wachet auf, ruft uns die Stimme" (1599) by Philipp Nicolai which paraphrases Jesus's parable of the wise and foolish virgins in Matthew 25:1-13. The movements which are not based on Nicolai's hymn incorporate paraphrases of Solomon's Song of Songs including the watchmen on the walls of Jerusalem, which encourages the wise and faithful to awake and prepare themselves for the coming of the bridegroom, and Solomon's courtship and marriage to the Shulamite maiden, which reinforces the idea of holy marriage between God and his chosen people, Christ and his church.

## REFLECTIONS FROM A PASTORAL COUNSELOR....



Nothing gets our attention like our mortality, which can be something we ignore and/or take for granted when things are going well. When our capability is interrupted--either temporarily due to perhaps post-surgical restrictions or permanently due to an irreversible disability-we are left with an adjustment of varying magnitude.

The ultimate manifestation of our mortality, of course, is death. The November 7, 2018 edition of THE CHRISTIAN CENTURY has as its cover article, "Don't forget, you're going to die."

Many of us are used to being self-sufficient and hold that as the standard to be maintained. A colleague who is from a farm community was told at an early age: "Love many, trust few, paddle your own canoe." But it can be hard to paddle with a broken arm or dislocated shoulder. Learning to accept assistance graciously can benefit the giver as well as the recipient. Both givers and receivers are necessary to keep the process moving. It is not a sign of inadequacy but an indication of being human when assistance is required. And being human is okay, which was confirmed with Christmas.

# **HUMAN RIGHTS ISSUES IN IRAQI KURDISTAN**

Julie Brown, a member of the Christian Peacemaker Team in Iraqi Kurdistan will speak in Rockwood Hall on **Wednesday, December 5, at 7 p.m.** Julie is a peace activist and human rights defender, born in rural Iowa and now living in Iraqi Kurdistan. She will speak about human rights issues in Iraqi Kurdistan, with a large focus on the life of villagers caught in decades of cross-border bombings. She will touch on the political aftermath of the US occupation and its impact on daily life. She will challenge us to consider what solidarity from within the US could look like and the role what we as US citizens have. The CRC Winter Clothing Drive distributed over 1,400 winter coats, plus snow pants, sweaters, scarves,




hats, mittens/gloves and boots. Our church donated both countless bags of winter wear and 13 members gave of their time during the distribution.



# "Crossings, a Doctor-Soldier's Story"

# By Jon Kerstetter Published in 2017

### Quoted from cover of the book:

"Crossings" is a memoir of an improbable, powerfully drawn life, one that began in poverty on the Oneida Reservation in Wisconsin but grew by force of will to encompass a remarkable medical practice.

Trained as an emergency physician, Kerstetter's thirst for intensity led him to volunteer in war-torn Rwanda, Kosovo, and Bosnia, and to join the Army National Guard. His three tours in the Iraq War marked the height of the American struggle there."

"But war was only the start of Kerstetter's struggle. The stroke he suffered upon returning from Iraq led to serious cognitive and physical disabilities. His years-long recovery, impeded by near- unbearable pain and complicated by PTSD, meant overcoming the perceived limits of his body and mind and re-imagining his own capacity for renewal and change."


"Crossings" is a searing, beautifully told memoir by a Native American doctor on the trials of being a doctor-soldier in the Iraq War, and then, after suffering a stroke that left his life irrevocably changed, his struggles to overcome the new limits of his body, mind, and identity."

Jon R. Kerstetter is a physician and retired U.S. Army Flight Surgeon. He is a graduate of the Mayo Medical School in Rochester, Minn. After joining the Iowa Army National guard in 1994, he served as a medical officer until his retirement in 2009. Kerstetter also holds an MS in business and an MFA in creative nonfiction.

Kerstetter was director of John Hopkins teaching program in emergency medicine in Kosovo and provided humanitarian medical care in the conflicts in Rwanda, Bosnia, and Kosovo. Kerstetter received healthcare and stroke rehabilitation at Univ Hospitals and Clinics and St Luke's Hospital in Cedar Rapids. He resides in Iowa City with his wife. They have 4 children.







# Our Children's Library

<u>The Birds of Bethlehem</u> by Tomie de Paola is a recent gift to our library. It was published in 2012 by Nancy Paulsen Books, a division of Penguin Young Readers Group. Preschool and kindergarten.

This beautiful book tells the story of the nativity from the viewpoint of birds near Bethlehem who observed some extraordinary sights. As the birds are eating breakfast in the field they talk to each other about some mysterious happenings. Two birds saw unusual numbers of people coming into town, others noticed that the inn had no more room, two more saw a couple having to sleep in a stable, and others saw a spectacular sight of angels appearing to shepherds in the field. Stories of animals visiting the baby Jesus are fairly common. This book is different because of its simple text and illustrations, its sense of mystery, and its reverent but straightforward view of the nativity. There are places in the book where preschoolers might participate verbally: noting the colors of the birds, and naming the baby in the manger.



<u>The Christmas Sky</u> by Franklyn Branley, illustrations by Stephen Fieser. NY: Thomas Y. Crowell, 1990. Grades 4-6.



Franklyn Branley (1915-2002 was a well-known and respected science writer and chairman of the Hayden Planetarium. This book is based on the annual lectures Branley delivered at the Planetarium during the Christmas season when he was chair of that institution. It is a revised edition of his 1966 book which was named a School Library Journal Best Book for that year. He examined several theories explaining what the Star of Christmas might have been. He discussed some of those theories and evidence that might discount some of them. He gave his theory of the year and season of Jesus' birth by looking at old tax records, noting the facts of Herod's rule and death, and the times when desert people grazed their sheep. Whether you agree with Branley's conclusions or not, this book will give older children some things to ponder . Dr. Branley helped originate the series of over 100 Let's Read and Find Out science books for children.
