Friends in Christ—

Each new year comes with its own new challenges and new opportunities. Somehow the change of the calendar can generate new resolve and new energy to tackle long-standing problems.

We come into 2019 perhaps more aware than ever of both the threat and the current reality of climate change. The wildfires in California, the melting glaciers, the powerful storms are all predicted outcomes of an increasingly warming planet.

Last October, the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change warned that the world has a little over a decade to bring down greenhouse gas emissions before dangerous levels of warming become inevitable.

In November a United Nations report found that the nations of the world are failing to take the action needed to stave off the worst effects of climate change and called on governments to introduce additional measures as a matter of urgency.

On the day after Thanksgiving, the Trump administration released a major climate assessment. It was the culmination of years of research by our nation's leading climate scientists. The report is required by Congress every four years and is issued by 13 federal agencies and the U.S. Global Change Research Program. This new report is the most detailed and blunt assessment yet of the dangers of unchecked global warming.

"Climate change is happening here and now," co-author Katherine Hayhoe of Texas Tech University said. "It is affecting all of us no matter where we live. And the more climate changes, the more serious and even more dangerous the impacts will become."

Joyce Msuya, deputy executive director of UN Environment, said: "We're feeding this fire, while the means to extinguish it are within reach."

The message of Christmas is that God loves human and earthly things. God has come to us in human flesh that we might love our time, our world all the more. And in loving this world we might glimpse the eternity that carries us all.

The proclamation of Epiphany is that the good news of God in Christ is made known to all the earth. This year in the weeks after Epiphany our congregation will explore how we might extinguish the fire of climate change that we have started and continue to feed. This exploration will be anchored by a Sunday morning adult education series. And other events and opportunities are being planned.

Be a part of this. Let's enter this New Year together with new resolve and new energy as we face the great challenge before us.

REFLECTIONS FROM A PASTORAL COUNSELOR......



For many mental health therapists, January brings about an increase in their caseload. It may be due to people putting therapy off until after the first of the year because the holidays are so preoccupying. Or perhaps it's due to issues arising during various holiday gatherings that now need processing.

A new calendar year also represents a fresh start or a second chance. Besides the frequent and obvious resolutions regarding exercise and weight loss, there may be a resolution concerning emotional, mental, and/or spiritual health--realizing one doesn't have to be sick to get better, Fresh starts and second chances may involve forgiveness and/or (re)new(ed) commitment. Such may include trying harder--though trying differently may generate more profound results.

A couple of biblical stories illustrate the power of fresh starts and second chances, including Naomi and Ruth in the Older Testament and the Parable of the Lost Son(s) in the Newer Testament. For several of the characters, they discovered hope at a much deeper level (the jury is still out regarding the Prodigal Son's older brother), which greatly enhances their lives.

May 2019 be kind to us . . . and we to it.

LOOK AHEAD: HOT TAMALE LOUIE COMES TO CONGREGATIONAL UCC ON SUNDAY, MARCH 24

At its meeting in November, our Church Council approved the request from the Mission Board to use \$4000 from our "Engagement Fund" to support four performances of *Hot Tamale Louie* in eastern Iowa, beginning with a concert here on March 24. The Engagement Fund established by an anonymous donor in October, 2013. The donor requested \$12,000 each to fund the Crisis Center, the Common Fund, and the Eastern Iowa Center for Workers' Justice. These grants were completed in 2017. The remaining amount is to be used to fund initiatives that will enhance the church presence in and service to the community.

Hot Tamale Louie – The Story of Zarif Khan is a composition by University of Iowa professor of music John Rapson." This production was based on the June 13, 2016, article in the *The New Yorker*, "American Chronicles: Citizen Khan," by Kathryn Schultz. (The full article can be read here.) Here's a brief synopsis of this complicated and complex story:

An Afghani child of 12 leaves his home near the Khyber Pass, wandering India for years before boarding a boat in Bombay and landing in Seattle. After exploring the American West, he settles in Sheridan, Wyoming, and takes over a business selling tamales. He works 80 hours a week, becomes famous for his food, and eventually learns how to invest in the U.S. stock market. As he gains and loses fortunes, he nonetheless lives frugally, choosing to spend his money in acts of kindness and generosity. He gains citizenship in 1925, has it revoked by U.S. xenophobic laws, and regains it again 30 years later. He becomes a legend, both back home in the borderland between Afghanistan and Pakistan and in Wyoming. He has an arranged marriage late in life and sires six children before abruptly and tragically being murdered in his 80s. His children and their offspring have recently founded a mosque in Gillette, Wyoming, that has drawn the ire of some eastern Wyoming residents and received national media attention.

In seeking funds to be a part of this project, our Mission Board noted that our congregation has provided significant support to immigrants and refugees in Iowa. We are also involved in interfaith work through the Consultation of Religious Congregations and the Johnson County Interfaith Coalition. This would provide a new venue for expressing our support of these efforts. This will enhance the church presence in and service to the community—a central goal of the Engagement Fund. Because we will be listed as a major sponsor of this project, it will increase our visibility in the community, therefore making it an appropriate recipient of money from the Engagement Fund. Our congregation is committed to interfaith cooperation and the support of immigrants and refugees. Music and free concerts for the public are also an important part of our common life. This project brings these interests and commitments together in a unique way that will increase our public visibility.

The concert, which features live music, slides, and narration, will be performed in our sanctuary on Sunday, March 24, at 3:00 p.m. Tickets will be both required and free. More information on tickets will be announced in the coming weeks. What you can do before March:



Drop offs will continue every Monday, Wednesday and Saturday from 10 am to 2 pm and Sundays from 1-3 pm through the week of the sale. Volunteers will be needed to sort or move boxes February 24-March 29.
- 2) Plan to donate time in March. We will need people to move boxes, sort books into subject categories, box books, etc. A sign-up sheet will be in Rockwood Hall and you can begin to consider how you might assist.
- 3) We will need lots of dollies to transport book boxes. If you have a dolly that you would be able to loan this enterprise for the month of March, please let the church office know.

The sale is a full community effort, with very strong support from the area churches. Last year our church was exceptional in its generosity of volunteer hours and book donations. Let's beat our 2018 record.

And while a graduate student at the New England Conservatory of Music, determined to pursue her own career as a concert singer, she met Martin Luther King Jr., a Baptist minister insistent that his wife stay home with the children.

In love and devoted to shared Christian beliefs as well as shared racial and economic justice goals, she married Dr. King, and events promptly thrust her into a maelstrom of history throughout which she was a strategic partner, a standard bearer, and so much more."






New Books on Forgiveness

The following books were bought recently to supplement the church school curriculum in January. They will be used in the classrooms, so may not appear on the book cart until February.




Get on Your Bike by Joukje Akveld (2018)


God Forgives Me, and I Forgive You


Martin Luther King Jr.
