Friends in Christ—

I recently saw a T-shirt at Raygun, now over on Dubuque St., that once again confirmed to me that it is, as they say, "The Greatest Store in the Universe." It showed the tuning heads of several guitars and announced, simply, "Stay Tuned."

Now, that might sound like good advice for these times when it often seems hard to keep up with world events. Stay tuned—more breaking news soon. As I write this the government shutdown is over, but a new one looms over the negotiations about border security this month. Stay tuned.

The downside of the "stay tuned" attitude is that we can become increasingly addicted to current events and checking our devices for updates. FOMO—Fear Of Missing Out—haunts people who worry about what's happening in their social network as well as those who worry about keeping up with current events.

The Raygun T-shirt put all of this in a new a perspective—urging us to *keep in tune*, to be ready to play. Guitarists and other string players know that this might require tightening or loosening strings. It requires twisting and turning and *listening*. When I played trumpet in high school, staying tuned meant sliding and watching an electronic tuner. And if you play the piano or organ, staying tuned might require professional help.

In all cases, those who stay tuned are ready for interaction with others, ready to function as a group, ready to sound good together.

Stay tuned—because whether we're working to create a sustainable world in the face of climate change, or to create racial justice, or to feed the hungry, or to welcome the stranger, or simply to live together as a congregation we need each other.

Life changes quickly. Stay tuned.

# THE ELEVATOR IS FINISHED

After many years of waiting and anticipation, our new elevator project is all but complete. While there are still a few items remaining to be finished up, the elevator is fully-inspected, approved, and functional. In terms of ease of use, convenience, and reliability, it is a huge step forward for our building and Congregation.

While there may still be a few bills to pay, the elevator's total cost will come in at approximately \$195,000. Our pledge payments and future fulfillment, as well as other individual donations, amount to \$133,000. That leaves around \$62,000 to be financed using other resources. Church Council and Trustees approved the use of \$82,000 from several church special funds, as well as a revolving line of credit from Hills Bank. These funds support the upfront costs of the unit itself and demolition, construction, and electrical work needed to complete the project in a timely fashion.

As our remaining pledges are completed, the revolving credit line will be paid back, and as much money as possible will be returned to Church special funds. There is no need for an additional pledge campaign. However, the sooner pledges are satisfied, the sooner the loan will be erased.

This special building, on this special corner, is home to a wonderful group of people - our Congregation. As always, thanks for your continued support.

Thank you for having an Offering of Letters at Congregational United Church of Christ. Though there have been many challenges, this has been a good year for advocacy:

The Global Food Security Act has been signed into law.

The Farm Bill fully funds the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) and improves international food aid programs.

The First Step Act provides criminal justice reform.

Bread's 2019 campaign will be announced in February. A focus will be on maternal and child nutrition and health. It can be tied into immigration: address the root causes that force people to immigrate. After the announcement, I can provide more details. I would be happy to do an adult forum and Offering of Letters at Congregational United Church of Christ in 2019.

### A REPORT FROM ROXENE REDENIUS, 2018 PRESIDENT OF THE CONSULTATION OF RELIGIOUS COMMUNITIES

Happy New Year to each of you! As we have ended one year and look to another, may we be ever mindful of our many blessings, including the presence of the CRC in our community. In this new beginning, and as I end my one year term as president, I am reminded of the joy and privilege we share in being able to help others through the CRC, by giving of ourselves, our time and our possessions.

In the past year a little more than \$42,000 was given to the Common Fund, which helps many who face eviction, remain safe and secure in their homes. (This surpassed our goal of \$36,000) The Winter Outerwear Clothing Drive helped approximately 1400 persons receive coats and other warm clothing to help get through this cold Iowa winter. The Center for Worker Justice continues to help low wage workers, regardless of race, ethnicity, or immigration status achieve social and economic justice. This past May they also assisted, and continue to do so, the 20 plus persons from Mt. Pleasant that were detained by ICE. And the Inside Out Reentry program helps formerly incarcerated persons build a new life in our community. The Gifts for Parents Event did not occur in 2018, but we are on track for a great event on December 7 of this year. All of these programs and events, and many more, are sponsored or supported by the CRC with volunteer hours and financial resources. Thanks to all of you for your support and involvement in all these efforts.

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### CRC Cont.

We have accomplished a great deal in 2018 and we will continue our support of the projects and programs we have been involved in, but it is exciting to think about what we can do in the coming year. One "new" project we look forward to is an Interfaith Build of two Habitat homes. Watch for information about this soon and ways you can be involved. Maybe you are not a tool kind of person, but perhaps you can provide food or snacks for those who are, or discover you have new or hidden talents in construction! Or maybe you can donate books or time to the Book Sale in March, or eat salads in the spring or enjoy soups in November, all to benefit the Shelter House.

If you are a walker or jogger, you can join the NAMI Walk on April 27, or contribute to it to help those who deal with mental illnesses. If "food" is your thing, or helping to make sure everyone has enough to eat, donations and preparation and serving assistance are always needed at the Free Lunch Program, or at Iowa City Compassion. Table to Table helps get surplus food from restaurants and grocery stores to places that can use it, relying mostly on volunteers and the Operation Backpack Program through HACAP, helps make sure school children have enough food for weekends. In addition to filling and delivery of the backpacks, it costs \$200 per school year for each child. The Crisis Center is always looking for volunteers, as well as donations, in a variety of areas and skill sets. Contact them and they will gratefully find a spot for you to give of your time.

The list goes on and on and on. There is no shortage of places to go to give of yourself, or programs and events to participate in. The CRC will continue to keep you informed of ways to help others and to be involved. Please also let us know about things you are planning as well.

Thank you again for all that you have done in 2018 to work with and support the CRC, and help many in our midst. With all of us working together I am confident 2019 will be another year filled with helping others on their life's journeys. As we walk in accompaniment with them I know we will all be blessed as well.

I have appreciated the opportunity to serve as president of the CRC this past year, and I am grateful for all your help and support. As Pastor Jill Cameron Michel takes over as our leader in mid-January, I am confident we will all offer her that same support and look forward to what her leadership brings to us.

And now may we all go forth in peace and remember those who need our help.

# ADULT MENTAL HEALTH FIRST AID TRAINING IN FEBRUARY AND MARCH

Two upcoming Adult Mental Health First Aid Classes in February and March in Iowa City/Coralville. The February Class will be Tuesday, February  $12^{th}$  and Friday, February  $15^{th}$  from 12:30 - 5:30 pm at the Coralville Public Library (1401 5<sup>th</sup> Street, Coralville, IA 52241). The March class will be Tuesday, March  $19^{th}$  and Thursday, March  $21^{st}$  from 12:30 - 5:30 pm at the Johnson County Services Building (855 Dubuque Street, Iowa City, IA 52240). Please sign up in advance by emailing Peggy at <u>mhedspecialists@gmail.com</u>. She will send you a Google form and once that is completed you will be registered for the class.

Classes are offered at no cost thanks to support from the Mental Health & Disability Services of the East Center Region. Classes are 2-days in the afternoon, lunch is NOT provided. 8 continuing education credits or CEUs are available upon request for a small fee, please contact Peggy in advance if you would like to receive CEUs for taking the course.

The Mental Health First Aid (MHFA) program is an interactive 8-hour certification class that introduces participants to risk factors and warning signs of mental health problems, builds understanding of their impact, and overviews common treatments.

Specifically, participants learn:

The potential risk factors and warning signs for a range of mental health problems, including: depression, anxiety/trauma, psychosis and psychotic disorders, eating disorders, substance use disorders, and self-injury, An understanding of the prevalence of various mental health disorders in the U.S. and the need for reduced stigma in their communities,

A 5-step action plan encompassing the skills, resources and knowledge to assess the situation, to select and implement appropriate interventions, and to help the individual in crisis connect with appropriate professional care,

The appropriate professional, peer, social, and self-help resources available to help someone with a mental health problem.

# LOOK AHEAD: *HOT TAMALE LOUIE* COMES TO CONGREGATIONAL UCC ON SUNDAY, MARCH 24

At its meeting in November, our Church Council approved the request from the Mission Board to use \$4000 from our "Engagement Fund" to support four performances of *Hot Tamale Louie* in eastern Iowa, beginning with a concert here on March 24. The Engagement Fund established by an anonymous donor in October, 2013. The donor requested \$12,000 each to fund the Crisis Center, the Common Fund, and the Eastern Iowa Center for Workers' Justice. These grants were completed in 2017. The remaining amount is to be used to fund initiatives that will enhance the church presence in and service to the community.

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### Hot Tamale cont.

*Hot Tamale Louie – The Story of Zarif Khan* is a composition by University of Iowa professor of music John Rapson. The concert, which features live music, slides, and narration, will be performed in our sanctuary on Sunday, March 24, at 3:00 p.m. Tickets will be both required and free. More information on tickets will be announced in the coming weeks. In seeking funds to be a part of this project, our Mission Board noted that our congregation has provided significant support to immigrants and refugees in Iowa. We are also involved in interfaith work through the Consultation of Religious Congregations and the Johnson County Interfaith Coalition. This would provide a new venue for expressing our support of these efforts. This will enhance the church presence in and service to the community—a central goal of the Engagement Fund. Because we will be listed as a major sponsor of this project, it will increase our visibility in the community, therefore making it an appropriate recipient of money from the Engagement Fund. Our congregation is committed to interfaith cooperation and the



support of immigrants and refugees. Music and free concerts for the public are also an important part of our common life. This project brings these interests and commitments together in a unique way that will increase our public visibility.

# Books for Children


# Black History Month

*Little Leaders: Bold Women in Black History* by Vashti Harrison (Dec. 2017) – Ages 8-11, Grades 3-7.

This book was recently purchased for our church library. It relates true stories of forty trailblazing black women in American history. Some are well-known and others less so. Among them are Harriet Tubman and Sojourner Truth (abolitionists), Bessie Coleman (pilot), Alice Ball (chemist), Shirley Chisholm (politician), Katherine Johnson (mathematician), Maya Angelou (poet), Julie Dash (filmmaker), Audre Lorde (poetry and prose), Marcelite J. Harris (Air Force General) Harrison began this as a personal Black History Month project, before it grew into a book.

Each entry includes two to three paragraphs of biographical text, followed by a

portrait (depicted as a black girl – every girl) in a background appropriate to the subject. The volume is beautifully designed and full of information about black women who made, and continue to make, history. A concluding "More Little Leaders" segment addresses the difficulty of picking out just 40 women for this book, and includes miniature notes on more women. This book was a *New York Times* and a *USA Today* bestseller.
