Friends in Christ:

I've said before that I love the "summer church"—those gatherings of God's people on warm or hot summer Sunday mornings. The pace is slower. The dress is casual. The mood is relaxed. Throughout the worship service we become aware of God and our neighbor and ourselves in new ways as we rest in the stillness of the summer morning.

One of the distinguishing features of Congregational/UCC hymnals is the number hymns on the subject of changing seasons. We found them in the old *Pilgrim Hymnal*. And they are still found in the more recent *Hymns of Truth and Light* and *The New Century Hymnal*. When Congregationalists sing, we take note of the cycles of the sun and the moon and the earth. And right now we sing with joy that "the summer days have come again."

While we affirm that God is revealed to us through the scriptures and most fully in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus, our hymns suggest that we can also understand something of the Holy One through the natural world as it changes through the year.

We're not naïve about this. The beauty of spring and the fullness of summer bring with them the destructive power of tornadoes, storms, and hurricanes. We know as well that the cold of winter increases the problems of hunger and homelessness. And all seasons seem to be a time for war rather than a time for peace.

If God is to be seen in the changing seasons, we often have to look very hard. Maybe this is the real point. Discerning what God is doing in the world and in our lives and our congregation is difficult work.

This summer I will be preaching from the Acts of the Apostles during worship. Those New Testament stories tell of early Christians trying to make sense of their faith in a tumultuous world while facing often dangerous opposition. As I read through this book in recent months, I began to see anew its connections with our world and our times.

I encourage you to read through Acts in the coming summer months. And join us for worship in air-conditioned splendor—a little break from the heat and humidity.

Reflections From A Pastoral Counselor



The human condition is a curious blend of fragility and resiliency, with the combination of each being unique to every individual. What may be a major obstacle for one person is a minor adjustment for another--and vice versa. And processing major or minor experiences varies since one size does not fit all.

Because people are like onions--we come in layers, which are based in part on developmental stages, chronology, and experiences--we sometimes need to process at one layer before moving on to the next one. So, for example, the processing we did in our 20s regarding our child-hood may be different when we do such processing in our 40s. Our awareness changes with new insights and expanded understandings. Sometimes what seemed so simple at one time may become more complex later.

A seminary professor used to say, "Plow your past" and "lean into the pain." He was encouraging greater self-awareness and more effective processing. It may not be easy work but it can be liberating. And we may discover strength we didn't know we had since resiliency can be hidden and subtle.

BROKERAGE ACCOUNT CHANGES

We have evaluated the fee structure of our current brokerage account at USBank compared to other brokerage services. As a result, we have decided to switch to a Vanguard brokerage account, which promises much lower transaction fees. We will be closing the USBank brokerage account soon.

If you choose to donate securities in the future, please call the church office to obtain two necessary numbers. These are the Vanguard DTC number and the Church Vanguard account number. Then give your broker this information. Please let the office know whenever a donation of securities is coming to the church.. Since the transmission of the donation contains only numbers with no names attached, this will allow us to identify and credit your donation.

COMMON FUND UPDATE

For the month of April 2019, the Common Fund's contributions to the Basic Needs Program provided 18 housing and utility assists for those in our community. Of those, 6 were for rent/deposits for new housing, 7 were electric bills, and 5 were water bills. Congregational UCC will provide at least \$2000 to the Common Fund this year.

In April, Common Fund staff had the pleasure of meeting Natalie. She recently moved to Iowa City with her children because her daughter has autism and needs to be close to UIHC. While her husband works out of state, Natalie and her children have been living in a hotel.

Natalie came to CommUnity for assistance paying the deposit on a rental house. Because they were required to pay a deposit, first month's rent, and last month's rent on a home that was big enough for their family, they did not have enough money to cover the cost. CommUnity was able to help with the deposit and Natalie will be able to move her family into the home, with her husband joining them shortly.

They were also able to provide a Birthday Bag for one of her children, helping to make this birthday a special one, even during a big transition.

OPPORTUNITIES AT SHELTER HOUSE

Shelter House is in need of committed, weekly volunteers to help in our Job Lab and at our Front Desk. See below for information on each volunteer position:\

Job Lab Volunteers

Job Lab takes place from 8-10AM Monday through Friday and 1-4PM on Tuesdays. Volunteers help clients search for jobs, use computers, create resumes, apply for government assistance, and/or post various job openings. This position works closely with our Employment Case Manager, so you will have on-site support from Shelter House staff. We need Job Lab volunteers for Tuesdays 8-10AM & 1-4PM, Thursdays 8-10AM, and Fridays 8-10AM.

Front Desk Volunteers

Front Desk volunteers assist staff in meeting the needs of clients and guests. Among the responsibilities of Front Desk volunteers are doing client laundry, answering calls and greeting guests, explaining services to guests, facilitating Drop-In Services when community members come for items or other services, sorting in-kind donations and organizing the donation garage. This position works closely with our Coordinated Entry staff person. We encourage Front Desk volunteers to commit to a three-hour shift once a week.

Front Desk volunteers are needed for the following shifts: Monday: 9-12PM and 1-4PM; Tuesday: 9-12PM; Wednesday: 9-12PM and 1-4PM; Thursday: 1-4PM and 4-7PM

Because their need is significant, IVHFH have offered to lend a hand. So, IVHFH is asking for some help from supporters of Habitat, concerned members of our community, and anybody that wants to use their muscles as we help our neighbors in North Liberty relocate.

IVHFH will be busy with this one-time project each Friday until the end of June and can take up to five volunteers each day. By Andy Douglas


Quoted from the book:

Over the last eight years author Andy Douglas has been allowed access, not as an employee or journalist, but as a member of a unique choral group composed equally of "insiders" and "outsiders" through a skilled blend of personal experience and essential information. Douglas bears witness to the intimacy and hope that a few hours of harmony can create behind bars."

"Douglas explores controversial issues of race, poverty, educational access, historical and cultural prejudice, and personal redemption. He weaves stories from the incarcerated, prison officers and wardens, counselors, and choral volunteers to shed light on their shared experiences--group singing inside a prison."

Andy Douglas is a writer and musician living in Iowa City. He holds an MFA in Nonfiction Writing from the University of Iowa, where he was the recipient of the Marcus Bach Fellowship for Writing about religion and culture. Douglas is active in the Community Sing movement, writes about social justice issues, does some spiritual direction work and leads a kiirtan and meditation circle.


"Finding Fortune"

"What Do You Believe? (Big Questions About Religion)"

By the editorial team at DK/Penguin Random House, 2016.


Big questions about religion are presented in a clear and unbiased text. Key concepts are broken down into manageable chunks of information, with major ideas being simply explained.

The first of four big sections is entitled "In the Beginning." First it asks, "Why believe?" It deals with that subject in earlier times, in India, in the Middle East, to the Enlightenment and beyond.

Section two is entitled" The Big Ideas." Readers are introduced to the myriad ways people around the world choose to live and think. What isabout? describes Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Hinduism, Buddhism, Sikhism, Native religions, East Asian religions, new religious movements, modern spirituality, and atheism.

Section three is entitled "Why do you? Some subjects are "the good books", prayer, festivals, feasts, & fasts, rites of passage, special clothing and hair treatments, eating traditions, and "giving up things."

Section four is entitled "The Search for Answers." It introduces philosophy of religion and asks, "What is God?" "They can't all be right, can they?" "If religions preach peace, why is everyone fighting?" "Why do bad things happen to good people?" It describes the relationship between religion and science, the moral maze, and at the end asks, "Is religion redundant?"



As an adult, I found this book fascinating and thought-provoking. Parents and young people might find some help with big questions and a taking-off point for good family discussions.
