#### GLORIA!—SPECIAL MUSIC SUNDAY DECEMBER 8

On **Sunday, December 8**, during 10:15 am worship, the Sanctuary Choir will be presenting **Antonio Vivaldi's** *Gloria*, RV 589, for **Special Music Sunday**! The work will feature three vocal soloists, UCCIC Children's Choir Director and soprano, Avery Nabholz, Sanctuary Choir member and soprano, Marie VonBehren, and University of Iowa DMA student and Alto, Kelly Hill.

Antonio Vivaldi composed this *Gloria* in Venice, probably in 1715, for the choir of the Ospedale della Pietà, an orphanage for girls (or more probably a home, generously endowed by the girls' "anonymous" fathers, for the illegitimate daughters of Venetian noblemen and their mistresses). The Ospedale prided itself on the quality of its musical education and the excellence of its choir and orchestra. Vivaldi, a priest, music teacher and virtuoso violinist, composed many sacred works for the Ospedale, where he spent most of his career, as well as hundreds of instrumental concertos to be played by the girls' orchestra. This, his most famous choral piece, presents the traditional *Gloria* from the Latin Mass in twelve varied cantata-like sections.

**THANKS!** During worship on November 17, we received \$1300 for our annual Neighbors in Need offering. Last year's total was \$1161. Neighbors in Need is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States. One-third of NIN funds support the Council for American Indian Ministry (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice. This year, special consideration will be given to projects focusing on serving our immigrant neighbors and communities.

#### STEWARDSHIP IS HEART WORK

The generosity and the commitment of a long line of members and friends—including you—have made our church on the corner stand strong. As we look forward to our ministry and mission in 2020, the Stewardship Board invites everyone to do the work of identifying and thinking about your heart's desire. #### CHILDREN'S OFFERING FOR THE MONTHS OF DECEMBER AND JANUARY

The Children will be learning about Jesus' birth story during December and January.

First, we will re-enact the Christmas Story in our Christmas Pageant during worship on Sunday, December 15<sup>th</sup>...then, we will discuss homelessness and refugees as it relates to Jesus' birth story. These are difficult topics, but parts of the story that comes alive for us in todays' news stories.

We will be talking about homelessness as well as prepare a special **Epiphany Gift**. The Magi brought gifts to the Christ child...we will bring gifts, too! Our Epiphany Gift this year is called a **Blessing Bag**. It is a gift of comfort and hospitality that will hopefully bring relief to those who wander our streets in search of shelter and a meal this cold winter. Our offering money for December and January will go to buy supply for the Blessing Bags.

## What is a Blessing Bag?

A Blessing Bag is a care package or survival kit designed especially for a person on the street. We have very specific instructions about what goes into a Blessing Bag. Our Blessing Bags will be sturdy, clear-plastic ziplock bags that contains supplies that may be needed by a homeless person such as Band-Aids, lip-balm, handwipes, gloves, socks, toothbrush & toothpaste, a food item and some cash. Each church school family will take one Blessing Bag with them to hand out this Epiphany Season to someone they meet in need in Iowa City.





### **Reflections From A Pastoral Counselor**



Soon we will hear--if we haven't already--"Oh, there's no place like home for the holidays." Maybe. It depends upon the type of home. Is it a home where there is, or has been, abuse (emotional, physical, sexual--some combination) and/or neglect? Or is it a life-enhancing home where people are affirmed, relationships nurtured, and shared history is valued?

For those who are dealing with the former, it may be healthy to avoid one's home of origin for the holidays. If such isn't possible, it may be helpful to structure the time (e.g. stay overnight in nearby motel, have meals in a restaurant, keep a trusted person close by). Self-care is not selfish, even if someone else thinks so.

Even with homes that have been appropriate, the holidays can be stressful with added obligations, close proximity, extended confinement (depending upon location and weather), and a change in routine. Effective coping may included outdoor (park walks, sledding, window shopping-weather permitting) and indoor (board games, charades in some form, seasonal DVD for group viewing) activities. Meal conversation might include everyone answering, "What's your best memory regarding the holidays?" Or "What do the holidays mean for you?" (There's no wrong answer.)

Perhaps the most significant intervention we can implement at the holidays is having realistic expectations--for ourselves and others. Unrealistically high expectations can increase the likelihood of disappointment and resentment. Little joys may linger longer if they are not encumbered by excessive expectations.

May your holidays be meaningful, pleasant, and realistic.



"A New Day/Un nuevo dia: The Timeless Story of the Nativity" by Don Bolognese

By Horse Drawn Books, Ltd, 2004. Written in English and Spanish. Ages 6-10.


The nativity story is translated into a modern setting in the Southwest near the Mexican border. Jose and Maria are farm workers heading back to Mexico after working the harvest in the U.S. Maria is about to have a baby and they cannot find a hotel or motel to take them in, so they take shelter in an abandoned service station. It is a timeless story that is as true today as it was with two poor travelers in the hills of Bethlehem two thousand years ago.

The *School Library Journal* describes the book as "spiritually uplifting...dramatized with simplicity and warmth, especially by the pictures, which are strong, eloquent paintings that display a wide range of moods and emotions."

Don Bolognese has also written some books published by Simon and Schuster. In their paragraphs about the author they write: "Don Bolognese was born in New York City to immigrant parents and grew up in an atmosphere of art and Italian culture. A graduate of the Cooper Union School Art, he determined early on that he would be an illustrator, and after illustrating works by many other authors he decided to write his own books."

Reverend Ann requested this book to use in our church school classes in December as an introduction to homelessness and immigration. It may either be displayed in Rockwood Hall or in the church school classroom, and may be checked out from either place.
