OCTOBER NEWS FROM CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

Cleaning house? Things we need for Christian Education:

<u>Clear</u> plastic storage boxes/bins <u>with lids</u>, any size. Place them on the shelves that are in the CE Office hallway.

<u>Musical instruments:</u> drums, tambourines, shakers, and rainsticks. Place them on the shelves in the CE hallway.

Art Supplies: ribbon, feathers, pony beads, rick-rack, and pompoms. CE hallway shelves.

We will also gladly accept sweaters, sweatshirts & sweatpants. Please begin collecting needed items. Carefully presort donated items, removing anything not listed here.

We'd appreciate donations of a box or two of large, strong lawn and leaf bags that can hold several coats for the shoppers. We also need to borrow a dozen sturdy coat racks.

And save the week of October 16 - 22 for volunteer opportunities as follows:

October 16 – set up & begin receiving donations (Sunday, noon - 4 p.m.)

October 17 & 18 – continue to receive donations, sort items & set up (Monday and Tuesday, 9 a.m. - 6 p.m.)

October 19–21 – distribution of clothing (Wednesday - Friday: 9 a.m. - 6:p.m.).

October 22 – distribution of clothing (Saturday, 9 a.m. – noon); Clean-up, noon to 4 p.m.

URGENT PLEA FROM THE JOHNSON COUNTY COMMUNITY FOOD BANK AND A WAY TO HONOR THE MEMORY OF CLAIRE ASHMAN

Our church received an urgent plea from Julia Winter, Director of Development at CommUnity for assistance with food donations, as well as monetary donations to purchase food in bulk. As you can imagine, the number of households served during these difficult times has steadily increased, as the government assistance shrinks and inflation is on the upswing. Also, HACAP's supply of bulk foods to order has decreased. Monetary gifts stretch much farther, however clients are very pleased by the random food donated which helps provide variety. Every donated food item must display a nutrition label to be offered. The Mission Board will have an ongoing donation box in Rockwood Hall, with a list of suggested items. Please consider canned protein sources, pastas, cereals, rice in small bags, boxed meal items, and personal care items. The needs change weekly. Monetary donations can be contributed on the website Donate (builtbycommunity.org) which also includes a printable form and address to mail a check. Needs change frequently, and Jane Kinney or Paula Forest can provide suggestions if needed. Claire Ashman devoted many volunteer hours to the food bank, so this will be a soulful way to honor her legacy.

The food bank also is in need of volunteers every week. I, Jane Kinney, would like to encourage you to volunteer there! There are options for times with no client contact, but I can tell you, interacting with the clients is personally a gratifying experience for me, and for the past year my weekly shift is one of the highlights of my week. As well, the staff and volunteers are an uplifting, fun group with to work. I believe it could be for you too!
