Friends in Christ:

November arrives with the last brilliant trees of autumn and the first bare trees of winter. The night comes early and for those who are morning people the sun once more rises by 6:00 a.m. We start this month with our annual All Saints jazz worship service, briefly acknowledging Veterans Day before our Thanksgiving gatherings, and we finally arrive on November 27 at the first Sunday in Advent.

These days are a time of mixed feelings: Joy and anticipation. Gratitude. Sorrow and melancholy. Regret. With the changing seasons, with the awareness of how our lives have changed and are changing, many are finding these days are filled with new and unexpected challenges.

Where can we take our sadness? Where do we go with our anguish?

I've often thought that on any given Sunday, a good 50% of the people who come to worship are on the verge of tears. We walk through those big red doors bringing family problems, trouble at work, concerns about illness and death. While some tend to stay away from worship when life is rough, this church is actually just the place where we need to go at such times.

There are few places left outside of the church where we can bring our weary souls and find some rest. There are few places left outside of the church where we can cry and know that our sorrow is accepted and respected.

Paul writes of God as the very "Father of mercies and the God of all consolation, the One who comforts us in our affliction." In mercy God does much more than help us to feel good again and get on with our lives as they always have been. God comforts us—that is, God gives us strength in adversity—so that we in turn might bring strength and consolation to others as God's agents in this weary world.

The mercy of God is an empowering force that calls us forward into God's new creation. This mercy forgives us for the wrong that we have done. This mercy forgives us for the good that we have failed to do up to this point. And even more, it then lifts us up and turns us toward the new day that is dawning, so that we might wait for the salvation of the Lord, the wholeness and well-being that God gives. This mercy tells us: All shall be well, and all shall be well and all manner of things shall be well.

Be kind to those you encounter in these days. Your kindness might make all the difference to someone else. And if life is hard right now, come and join others in seeking the God of all consolation.



THE UNITARIAN UNIVERSALIST SOCIETY IS SPONSORING A UKRAINIAN FAMILY and is looking for help with miscellaneous tasks. The father, Ahmad Alhroob, came here last July to start a Jordanian Fellowship at UI Hospital's Neonatal unit. His home country, Jordan, is paying him to be here, but the salary is limited. Ahmad's wife is Ukrainian and had to flee to Germany with their two daughters, 8 and 10. It was too expensive there and there was no school, so the mother and daughters went to Jordan. They will be arriving in Iowa City soon.

The following help is needed:

- 1. Volunteers to take them to the food bank and grocery store for items the bank doesn't have, such as milk
- 2. Find winter clothing and boots for the family
- 3. Find furniture through Houses into Homes, etc.
- 4. Locate kitchen items, including plates, glasses, pots and pans
- 5. Help them find an apartment
- 6. Provide transportation to appointments
- 7. Tutor English
- 8. Money to pay first month's rent and a security deposit, estimated at \$2,000.

WARM WINTER WEAR UPDATE

Thanks to everyone who helped make this year's event a success. They gave away a total of 1867 coats from Wednesday, 10/19, through Friday, 10/21. This consisted of 1325 coats for children (sizes 3 mo - size 18, boys and girls.) and 542 coats for adults (sizes S - XXXL, men and women). All scarves, boots and gloves were given away. They had a total of more than 300 families represented, and many of the individuals were shopping for a minimum of 8 people.



Unfortunately, they had to contact those who had hoped to shop on Saturday because they were all out of popular clothes. Most of the items were actually gone by Thursday afternoon. They were unable to meet the needs of at least 95 children from sizes 10 - 18, especially 14/16/18 (including both boys and girls). Adult coats were in demand, and they could have used many more coats of all sizes.

28 brand new coats for children, sizes 2 and 3 (and a couple size 4/5), and the few remaining hats were given to the Catholic Worker House, which supports many immigrant families.

Thank you to the more than 80 volunteers who spent time sorting, organizing, and serving as shopper assistants. This help was invaluable. Many individuals signed up to assist, and some service organizations were represented among the volunteers.

Donations were received from a large number of faith communities and individuals. A more detailed report will be available later.

Counselor Joins CPCS

Dear participating member congregations, I am writing to introduce myself as a new counselor at CPCS. My name is Ken Fate and I am pleased to begin working with CPCS as a Licensed Mental Health Counselor (LMHC) in the state of Iowa. I am currently accepting clients at our office at 30 North Clinton St, Iowa City.

I retired as a school teacher, coach, principal and counselor in eastern Iowa and western Illinois. Following a career in education, I have 10 years of experience as a LMHC, 5 years part-time in Cedar Falls and 5 years full-time in Cedar Rapids. My experience has been working with children, adults, families and couples with relationship and developmental concerns. This includes coping with the stress of adjustment disorders, anxiety, and depression. My orientation to counseling focuses on the strategies of cognitive behavioral therapy, family systems therapy, play therapy, mindfulness techniques and brief therapy.

While I am not a trained spiritual counselor, I will be taking course work in that area soon. In the meantime, my counseling with CPCS will be as a traditional LMHC helping people who are looking to address behavioral and emotional concerns that they are experiencing in their lives. I am currently seeing clients in the office.

I am an active member of Gloria Dei Lutheran Church in Iowa City participating in choir, men's Bible study and team chair of our companion parish relationship with Same Cathedral Parish in Tanzania. My wife Mavis, is a retired nurse from the U of I. I have two daughters who are married and live in Fort Collins and Minneapolis. I enjoy biking, tennis, golf and traveling with our small camper and Bella, our spunky Labrador retriever.

AN UPDATE FROM SHELTER HOUSE





This work is a lot of things. It is nourishing. It is exhausting. It is necessary. It is never the same. It provokes tears of joy and of sadness and of frustration. Every day, this work is something a little different, but one thing it is guaranteed to be? A roller coaster.

2022 has been a roller coaster.

This has been a year without the safety of a federal eviction moratorium. A year that has seen the gradual emptying of coffers designated for rapid rehousing and eviction prevention. A year of variants—Omicron, Delta—each of which reminds Shelter House staff that we are and always will be on the frontline of every crisis, whether it be economic, political, public health, or a terrifying mix of these.

And whether despite or because of it all, we have much to celebrate.

In June, <u>Shelter House opened 501 Southgate</u>, a 36-unit apartment building providing permanently affordable housing with available support services to individuals in our community exiting chronic homelessness. Thirty-six apartments with 36 leases for 36 people in our community who no one else would house. Now they are home.

In September, Executive Director <u>Crissy Canganelli was recognized with the State's highest award for a housing advocate</u>: the Kay Anderson Friend of Iowa award at the Iowa Finance Authority's annual Housing Iowa Conference.

Three weeks later, Shelter House representatives made the trek back to Des Moines to accept the <u>Iowa Architectural Foundation's Community Enhancement through Architecture</u>

<u>Award</u>. This award was not something we expected, and we were humbled by the jury's observation: "Shelter House has grown to meet the challenges of homelessness in their community, and their emphasis on well-designed architecture is an expression of the respect they hold for the people they serve."

This is what it is all about, isn't it? We can cite statistics and data and show you charts and graphs—and we will, we promise—but *this* is what it is all about. Meeting people where they are. Treating them with the dignity and respect they deserve as humans living through a hard time in a hard world.
