Friends in Christ:

As 2023 begins, we are at a new place. It seems that we have come through the worst of the pandemic as a nation, community, and congregation. Because 2023 is not 2020, however, we need to discern and discover the new things that we want to create and do as a congregation. Even more, we need to discern and discover the new things that God is creating and doing among us, with us, and through us. This is never a simple or easy task.

I think this means that the coming year will be a time of rebuilding. We need to help all active members find meaningful ways to connect with one another and to be involved in the ministry and mission of our congregation. We need to reach out to members and friends who have been away for any of a number of reasons, so that they might find a renewed sense of belonging and purpose in our congregation. And we need to open ourselves to the changes in our life together that new members will make possible.

This will require finding new ways to talk openly and honestly with each other, new ways to meet together, and new ways to worship, pray, and learn together. This means making additional progress in becoming a hybrid church—with both an in-person and an online presence: for example, expanding our technological infrastructure so that meetings can better include all people and improving our website capabilities to allow for better communication between members.

This will require—let me be honest about it—"more" from each of us and all of us as we rebuild and become God's new creation in this place. This is the joyful task that is set before us. And with Paul, I am convinced that by the power at work within us, God is able to accomplish abundantly far more than all we can ask or imagine. (Ephesians 4:20)

And this is where the past comes in—not just 2022, but the years before as well. There is much that is in place for our rebuilding. Over the past decade we have renovated, repaired, and restored our church building so that it is in very good condition. Over the past decade our generosity has not only met the needs of our community and the wider world, it has allowed us to build a strong financial foundation that stands even during the current economic upheavals. Over the past decade we have developed significant programs of Christian education for people of all ages so that we are able to grow in faith, hope, and love. Over the past decade solid preaching and inspiring music have anchored our worship and brought people into our congregation. By God's grace and strength, we are more than up to our call to rebuild.

How do we proceed? Together.

UCC-JCIC CORE TEAM: SUPPORTING THE JOHNSON COUNTY INTERFAITH COALITION

The Johnson County Interfaith Coalition (JCIC) is a multi-cultural, faith-based community coalition whose mission is to advocate for social justice and equity, first and foremost for persons of color.

Our congregation has had a "Core Team" supporting the Johnson County Interfaith Coalition since we joined the coalition in 2019. Thirty members of the congregation are currently members, and they receive general updates about activities of the organization and opportunities to support or volunteer throughout the year. Fewer than 1 update email is sent a month; we have a commitment that there will not be regular or irregular meetings. CRC GIFTS FOR PARENTS REPORT

After a two-year absence, the Consultation of Religious Communities *Gifts for Parents* returned to St. Mark's United Methodist Church on Saturday, December 3rd. This event provided children, 4-14 years old, with the opportunity to select a free gift for three important adults in their lives. Information about the event was shared through the Iowa City Community District Student/Family advocates and the Neighborhood Centers of Johnson County. Families picked up a color-coded time-specific admission ticket at the CommUnity (formerly the Crisis Center) food bank during the prior two weeks.



A wide range of excellent gifts were donated by local faith communities & organizations. Items were received, sorted & organized by volunteers on December 1st & 2nd. Families were admitted at their assigned time (or later), and each child was welcomed by an adult escort who assisted them in making gift selections. Each gift was wrapped and labeled with the name of the intended recipient. Families had the opportunity to enjoy pancakes, turkey sausage, orange juice, milk & coffee provided by the St. Mark's Men's Group and other volunteers.

Although 131 families secured reservation tickets, only 59 families attend our event this year. None-the-less, 186 children experienced the joy of selecting gifts for others and all of the families appreciated our hospitality during this holiday season. Gifts not selected were shared with the following non-profit organizations: Crowded Closet, Domestic Violence Intervention Program, Goodwill, Open Heartland, Salvation Army, and Shelter House. Unopened milk & juice were donated to the Catholic Worker House.

Sincere thanks to our many welcoming, friendly and diligent volunteers! We were able to fill all but 30 of our 154 potential volunteer timeslots, with our biggest need being for 17 of 40 escorts. Fortunately, this deficit wellmatched the limited participation of families during the late morning and noon hour.

Overall, the children, their adults and our volunteers seemed to have a positive and joyful experience at this year's *Gifts for Parents*.

Update on the Consultation of Religious Communities (CRC)

Our church has been a part of the CRC for many years, actually decades. Currently, John Fuller and Sue Dayton are our representatives to the CRC which meets monthly for a program and business meeting. The CRC sponsors the winter clothing distribution and Gifts for Parents. The organization was instrumental in the formation



of the Common Fund, The Center for Worker Justice, and, years ago, Ecumenical Towers. The group maintains close partnerships with Shelter House, Habitat for Humanity, Johnson County Affordable Housing, Inside Out, Veterans for Peace, HACAP, The Center for Worker Justice, and The Johnson County Interfaith Coalition (JCIC). Monthly programs highlight these and other non-profits and help our faith communities learn about ways to support these groups in our community.

The group is governed by an executive board made up of 5 officers. In recent years, it has become increasingly difficult to find people who are willing to fill these offices. The current officers have been serving for several years in what are meant to be one-year positions. These individuals have given lengthy service to CRC and are no longer willing to continue to serve which has brought us to a crisis point for the organization.

At the November CRC meeting a motion was made and passed that the CRC would take a 6-month hiatus and reconvene in May to make a decision about the future, and possible dissolution, of the CRC. During these 6 months it is hoped that there will be conversation and reflection among our faith communities, and also a gathering of clergy to reflect and brainstorm ideas for the future.
