Friends in Christ:

A couple of weeks ago a member sent me an email with the subject line: "A Needed Sermon Topic?" Well, I'm always open to sermon topics and indeed, sometimes I need one. So I was glad to get this.

The member was concerned about the ways in which we are constantly bombarded with information, much of it "bad news" about some disaster or tragedy. We're not really designed as human beings to take all of this in. For example, for most of history, an earthquake killing thousands in another part of the world might never be known by countless others. Distant wars were just that—distant.

Now we know everything that happens as it happens. And the result, this member said, is compassion fatigue. We can become worn out by hearing about and caring about and responding to the myriad events that come to our awareness. "Compassion fatigue," this member concluded, "just might make a good sermon title."

I kept thinking about this and found myself thinking about it during the offering on Sunday. I was holding one of the One Great Hour of Sharing banks that I was planning to give to the children during the children's message. I looked down at it and saw the surprising words of Paul to the Galatians: "So let's not allow ourselves to get fatigued doing good. At the right time we will harvest a good crop if we don't give up..." (Galatians 6:9) Wow!

Maybe compassion fatigue has been with us for a much longer time than we might imagine. We can get overwhelmed. Paul suggests that we set our sights beyond what is right in front of us and look toward the harvest to come. And he urges us to work for the good of all when the opportunity comes.

This is why a congregation—our congregation—is so important. We do get tired. We experience compassion

tatigue. But we have others who can help us when we are down so that we can help others when they are down
We keep encouraging generosity in one another because there a plenty of opportunities to work for the good of
all. There is some wisdom here for Lent this year. I need to keep thinking about this and I invite you to do so a
well.
