Friends in Christ:

One day in the middle of July, a young man appeared at the door to my study. He'd found his way upstairs, but he was looking for the Chapel, having seen the sign, "Meditation Chapel Open Monday-Friday," on the north side of our building. I took him back downstairs, turned on the lights, and told him that he could stay as long as he liked. Sometime later he came back upstairs just to say thanks—thanks to this congregation for providing such a needed space.

Others seem to be finding the chapel as well. This is another indication that our ministry and mission here on the corner are developing in new and renewed ways. We are not "getting back to normal." We are not "getting back to the way things were." We are not "getting back" anywhere. We are moving forward—offering who we are and what we have as a congregation to the community around us.

Over the years, a number of people—some students, some not—have used our chapel throughout the week, some of them writing notes of thanks or words about themselves in the notebook that we keep there. It provides an important place of quiet and rest in our often noisy and crowded community.

While a cross is predominantly displayed, ours is an interfaith chapel. Muslims have used it for their daily prayers. Buddhists have chanted there. My guess is that atheists and agnostics have occasionally found solace in the quiet and beauty of that space. It is a "house of prayer for all people." (Isaiah 56:7)

In addition to positions on church boards, there are also a number of positions representing the church to particular agencies or organizations. Members of the church serve as representatives to the Eastern Iowa Association, the Community Pastoral Counseling Service, the Common Fund and a number of others. As an alternative to serving on a church board, you might serve as a special church representative.

Stewardship Board and Church Council Approve Two Church Endowment Fund Proposals

In June, the Stewardship Board and Church Council approved two proposals for spending a portion of the interest earned on the **Church's Endowment Fund**. The first proposal, from the Mission Board, was to contribute \$25,000 over five years to the Iowa City Domestic Violence Intervention Program (DVIP) building fund. DVIP is mounting a \$6 million Finding Safety, Building Hope capital campaign to build a new emergency shelter in Johnson County for victims of domestic violence in an eight-county area. DVIP's current facility is operating at full capacity with continued growth in the number of individuals needing DVIP's services. Members of the Stewardship Board and Church Council were in full agreement that this investment in DVIP will greatly benefit the community by helping to meet an important need. With this gift, Congregational Church is one of only two Iowa City churches to contribute to DVIP at this level.

At the same June meetings, the Stewardship Board and the Church Council also approved a proposal, presented by Bill Lovin and Marie Von Behren for \$2,000 to purchase choral music (\$1,000) for the choir and organ music for organist Bill Crouch. Our choir under the leadership of Chris Nakielski has demonstrated skill in bringing new choral music into the church, thereby enriching the worship experience. This purchase will enable the choir to present one new anthem per month. In similar fashion, Bill Crouch has given us wonderful organ music for many years and the \$1,000 will enable him to purchase more organ music to add to his and the church's repertoire.

Both these gifts represent our Church's investment in activities that resonate with our overall mission for both our church and our community. The Stewardship Board continues to encourage individuals and church boards to suggest other ideas for expanding our overall mission in ways that are like these. And we also encourage individuals who would like to contribute to these kinds of investments to consider making a gift to the Church's Endowment Fund. KAREN GEORGIA THOMPSON BECOMES FIRST WOMAN TO LEAD UCC

TED CHURCH On Monday, July 3, The General Synod of the United Church of Christ elected the Rev. Karen Georgia Thompson as the first woman, and the first Black woman, to lead our denomination as General Minister and President. A Jamaican immigrant, Thompson is the third person of African descent to serve as leader of the denomination.

"As I stand here before you as your newly and duly elected General Minister and President, I stand here as a Jamaican immigrant woman, a mother and a grandmother, a sister and a friend to many," Thompson said. "... The enormity of this moment will be with me for many years to come."


Her election took place at the UCC's 34th General Synod in Indianapolis, with 626 delegates voting for her election, 43 against and seven abstaining. She starts her new role August. 1. In a prayer after the vote, surrounded by her family, she recalled Synod's theme, quoting Revelation 21:5 — "Behold, I am making everything new."

Thompson has been serving as Associate General Minister for Wider Church Ministries and Co-Executive for Global Ministries since 2019. She has served in the National Setting of the United Church of Christ since 2009, previously as minister for racial justice and minister for ecumenical and interfaith relations. Prior to joining National Setting staff, Thompson served on staff of the UCC's Florida Conference, as a church planter in Florida and in family ministries in New York.

Thompson holds a doctorate in ministry, with a dissertation in religious multiplicity among African Caribbean people, from Seattle University; a master of divinity degree from Union Theological Seminary; and a master of public administration degree from North Carolina Central University.

As the UCC's current Officer for global concerns and interfaith relations, Thompson speaks frequently about building connections on all levels. "Being church means we are locally rooted and globally focused, connecting the issues we see in ways that allow us to bring justice to the world," she has said.

In collaboration with the Johnson County Affordable Housing Coalition and the Greater Iowa City Homebuilders Association, the Housing Action Team of the Johnson County Livable Community for Successful Aging's Policy Board initiative will host Lego Accessory Dwelling Unit (ADU) design competitions at community events.

They are looking for volunteers to help staff their Lego building competitions for kids! Instructions will be provided before your shifts, but the primary premise is to supervise the site and help children create Lego ADUs.

These competitions are to inform the public regarding the community benefits of allowing ADUs within zoning and building code. Policy changes to minimize lengthy application processes, decrease high fees, and eliminate harsh regulations associated with the development of ADUs will increase the supply of this more affordable type of housing for individuals 50-plus.

The Johnson County Livable Community Housing Action Team is a recipient of an AARP 2023 Community Challenge Grant. The funding will be utilized to implement a marketing program regarding Accessory Dwelling Units (ADUs) utilizing LEGO design competitions among students at public events and public locations including Tiffin REC Fest (8/5), Iowa City Farmers Market (8/5, 9/2, 10/7), the Solon Public Library (Late August, TBD), the North Liberty Public Library (Late September, TBD), and the Coralville Public Library (Late October, TBD).
