Friends in Christ:

Lent begins early this year. Unlike Christmas, which is always celebrated on December 25, the date for Easter moves around, determined by the sun and the moon. As you know, Easter is the first Sunday after the first full moon falling on or after the vernal equinox. This year that Sunday is March 31. Our Lenten preparations for Easter begin roughly 40 days (not counting the Sundays) before that—on Ash Wednesday, February 14 this year.

In the days ahead we move from winter into spring, from darkness into increasing hours of daylight. We also move from ashes to resurrection. In the process we have the opportunity to become freshly aware of God's love, mercy, hope, and strength in our lives.

"Lent is not tidy," writes Peter Mazar. "Days grow longer (the word 'Lent' comes from 'lengthen'), the ground thaws, and the next thing we know, everything is filthy. Our windows need washing, our temples need cleansing, the earth itself needs a good bath. The English names for these months come from ancient words that reflect the need to roll up our sleeves this season: February ('purification') and March ('the spirit of war'). Good names. Winter doesn't leave without blustery battles that push things over and mess things up and even break things."

Lent is a time of reconciliation. We face ourselves, we face our neighbors, we face our God and recognize that our relationships and our lives are not what they should be. As Lent begins, we hear once more the grace-filled invitation of Jesus: "Turn and believe the good news." In faith we are invited to look and move in new directions. The old Shaker hymn tells us: "To turn, turn will be our delight." These days are a time to reorient ourselves, to find our bearings once more—"Til by turning, turning, we come 'round right."

We begin all of this together on Ash Wednesday, "a day of happiness," as Thomas Merton wrote. "It cannot be otherwise, as it forms part of the great Easter cycle." Lent is the "holy spring," a season of healing, restoration, and new life. God has made a new beginning in Jesus Christ. The season of preparation that is Lent is a time to give yourself to being a part of that new creation.

This year, I invite you to begin this journey of renewal by joining others as we worship God on Ash Wednesday, February 14, at 7:00 p.m. As the days ahead unfold, use them as opportunities for spiritual growth and renewal.

David has served on the steering committee of the Society of American Archivists College and University Archives Section, is a past president of the Midwest Archives Conference, past chair of the Big Ten University Archivists Group, and past chair of the Consortium of Iowa Archivists. Before entering the archives field, David was a reporter for radio stations in the Midwest and in Alaska. David and his husband James live in Iowa City.

IOWA FACES THE '60'S—A TALK BY CUCC MEMBER AND PROFESSOR EMERITUS, SCHOOL OF PLANNING AND PUBLIC AFFAIRS, CHUCK CONNERLY

Thursday, February 22, 2024, 4:00 pm; Kollros Auditorium--101 Biology Building East As Iowa entered the 1960s, it faced issues that reflected the transition from an agricultural, rural state to one that had become majority urban with consequent tensions between its urban and rural communities—tensions that continue to this day. At the same time, Iowa's food-based economy seemed increasingly out of sync with a national economy driven proportionately less by the consumption of food and more by growing consumer demand for homes, cars, televisions, hi-fis, and clothes—items that the Iowa foodbased economy did not produce to a significant degree. The talk will focus on these changing conditions as well as the key policy responses and debates that would characterize Iowa politics and public policy into the 1960s. The talk represents the first part of the Chuck's current book project-- *Iowa in the 1960s: Politics, Public Policy, and Governance in an Era of Change*.

DOMESTIC VIOLENCE INTEREVENTION PROGRAM HOLDS SOUPER BOWL

The **Souper Bowl** was created by DVIP Executive Director, Kristie Fortmann-Doser, to challenge the myth that more violence occurs against women around the NFL Super Bowl. Violence against women, men, and children happens every day. **1 in 4 women**, **1 in 7 men**, **and 1 in 15 children** will be affected by intimate partner abuse in their lifetime. This event is essential to our agency because it provides financial support to ensure our advocates are there when victim/survivors need them. It demonstrates that we, as a community, support and believe victim/ survivors.

In 2023, Congregational UCC committed \$25,000 over a five-year period to help DVIP build its new shelter. DVIP opened its first shelter for people threatened by domestic violence in 1980, and now DVIP covers eight counties in southeastern Iowa — Johnson, Iowa, Cedar, Des Moines, Henry, Lee, Van Buren and Washington. The nonprofit provides emergency shelter, pet shelter, peer-to-peer counseling, education and prevention at the state and federal level, youth advocacy, a 24-hour hotline and other services to victims and survivors.
