Friends in Christ:

I want to thank our Church Council—and the whole congregation—once more for making my "mini sabbatical" possible during the month of July. It was an incredibly productive time for me. I was able to begin the writing about preaching that I have wanted to do for some time. I say "begin" because there is certainly much more to think about and write about before all of this is in anyway fit for public consumption. But it was a good start!

And it was also, surprisingly, a time of renewal. I am back in active ministry, not only rested but with a new perspective on my calling here. As I have said quite often over the past year and a half, we are in a time of renewal, rebuilding, and moving forward here at Congregational UCC. With the rest and restoration that came to me, I feel more ready to lead us as we continue to be God's active people on this corner.

Just as July was ending, I received an article by the Rev. Prince Rivers, the pastor at Union American Baptist Church in Durham, NC. Writing about ministry in particular, he said, "No matter the size or setting of the congregation, there is always something to do." Then he continued, addressing all manner of things that we do, "Work is good. Doing good work is even better. But Thomas Merton warns us about the shadow side to the non-stop activity we often use to define our significance to ourselves and to others."

The concern of Merton (and Rivers) is for the "idealist"—the" person who is changing the world, championing a cause or fighting the good fight..."he frenzy of the activist neutralizes his [or her] work...It destroys the fruitfulness of his [or her]...work, because it kills the root of inner wisdom which makes work fruitful."

There are many challenges that we face as a community and a nation. Our natural Congregational tendency toward activism pushes us to "get out there and get going." In the days before us, however, we might want to listen to Rivers who invites us to seek "God's inner wisdom and to resist the frenzy of overwork and embrace the gifts of silence and solitude....As you make plans for the work you want to accomplish, don't forget to slow down enough for all to be well with your soul."




WOMEN'S LUNCH—AUGUST 22

SERVING OUR CONGREGATION

Every year in January a slate of new members for the various church boards is presented to the congregation for approval. Work to prepare this slate occurs throughout the fall and is managed by the two Council Members At Large, Megan Carnes and Andrea Rauer.

This work is now underway, and we would like to invite all members of the congregation to consider serving on a Board. Serving on a Board is an excellent way to develop close working relations with other members of the church.

What is involved in serving on a Board? Each of the six church Boards meet monthly, often on a week day evening. Each of the boards has different responsibilities, and thus the tasks undertaken by each board are different. For example, the Membership Board plans the church picnic and other fellowship events; the Trustees provide oversight of the church budget and the building.

In addition to positions on church boards, there are also several positions representing the church to particular agencies or organizations. Members of the church serve as representatives to the Eastern Iowa Association, the Community Pastoral Counseling Service, the Common Fund, and other organizations. As an alternative to serving on a church board, you might serve as a special church representative.

Students come from 28 denominations across southern Africa including the <u>United Congregational Church of South Africa</u>. From its start, TEE was open to both men and women and to people of all races.



Our annual TEE offering will be received during worship on Sunday, September 22. This offering has been a tradition in our congregation for several decades. WINTER CLOTHING DISTRIBUTION COMING IN OCTOBER

The Winter Clothing Distribution (WCD), sponsored by the Consultation of Religious Congregations, will be from the afternoon of Sunday, 10/13, through the early afternoon of Saturday, 10/19. Over the span of these days we will set up, accept clothing donations, sort & organize clothing, distribute the clothing, & clean up after the event. A detailed schedule will be provided by late August.

The event will be held in the gymnasium of The River Community Church (RCC), 3001 Muscatine Avenue, in Iowa City. This facility has plenty of parking space and is on a bus route.

This year CRC will be partnering with the Iowa City Police Department (ICPD), which will provide clothing donations & volunteers. Shortly after the 2023 event, the ICPD held a one-day WCD at Mercer Park Recreation Center, distributing about 1,000 coats donated at their community collection boxes. They were interested in developing a new approach, so a community facilitator brought CRC & ICPD representatives together for a series of meetings that culminated in this partnership.

For 2024 we will be increasing the number of family representative shoppers to 10 per 30- minute period. (Eight individuals will need to register via SignUpGenius; there will be two openings for drop-ins.) Volunteers will also need to enroll via SignUpGenius.

As in past years, they are looking for donations of gently used or new WARM winter wear, with an emphasis on coats, snow pants, hats, mittens, gloves, scarves, boots & winter shoes. Heavy sweaters & sweatshirts are also appreciated.

Your donations of quality winter clothing & your volunteer participation will be most greatly appreciated! Further details will be provided in coming weeks.

FALL DIAPER DRIVE for CommUnity Food Bank: The Mission Board will hold a diaper drive in September and October to help the Food Bank replenish its supply of diapers for families in need. The Food Bank relies on donations for non-food items such as disposable diapers. Please help babies and toddlers in our community stay dry, clean, and healthy by participating in the diaper drive. Diaper sizes 3, 4, 5, and 6 are the most needed as well as baby wipes. There are two ways you can help. Buy a package of disposable diapers and wipes and bring them to Rockwood Hall. We will ensure that everything is delivered to the Food Bank. Or, if you would like to make a personal donation to



support this drive, please write a check to the church with Diaper Drive on the memo line and the Mission Board will use the funds to purchase diapers. Whichever way you choose, your donation will help restock the Food Bank's diaper supply, provide free diapers for babies and toddlers in need and bring some economic relief to families.
