Politics is about the values we honor, the money we spend, and the process we follow so that we can live together with some measure of justice, order, and peace.

For people of faith, concern with politics is never simply about the triumph of one party or another. It is a way that we seek to live out the two great commandments—loving God as we love our neighbor. Our faith keeps opening the doors of our church and calling us into relationship with the rest of the world. We won't always like what we see and hear, but we are called to look and listen. We won't always get it right but we are called to raise our voices like a trumpet.

It is only as we relate to the poor and the hungry, only as we work toward peace, only as we recognize the judgement of God on all our actions that our light will break forth and healing shall come.

We have come this far by grace, sheer grace. That is cause once more for thanksgiving and gratitude—this month and every month. We are the heirs of a glorious and troubled past, living in a troubled and sometimes fearful present. And with some slight echo of gratitude in our hearts we might go forward with some modicum of compassion for others. We might show some basic Christian love, some basic Christian decency.

We know now that each vote matters. In this very troubled and hurting world, voting is one of the most empowering, just, and peaceful actions we can take to make a difference.



CHRISTIAN EDUCATION NEWS & ANNOUNCEMENTS



On October 6, 2024, in response to the devastating effects of Hurricane Helene, Congregational UCC members brought cleaning and personal care donations and First Presbyterian donated water to miraculously & perfectly fill my van with cleaning and personal care items. As many of you know, my mother, stepfather, sister's family and many friends live in the Asheville area, as we lived there from 2004-2012 and Nadia and Peter were born there. Tucked in the Blue Ridge mountains, this area is an oasis of natural beauty, art and history.

I was able to drive into the area safely via the Great Smoky Mountain Expressway, adding a scenic but time consuming 3-4 hours to the normal 11 hour drive. The devastation to Interstate 40 between Knoxville and Asheville can be seen here: https://youtu.be/ojYWY1c11E4?si=BUROSQ9VoHc0FVFZ and will take "months at a minimum" to repair. Communities like Chimney Rock and Swannanoa are almost completely destroyed and the River Arts District, home to many art galleries, restaurants, breweries and small theaters was about 80% destroyed. At the time of my visit, a week and a half after the storms, most debris had been cleared from roads, but the destroyed buildings, toppled cars and downed power lines remained untouched.

When I arrived mid-day on Tuesday, several folks were at my mom's church, Montmorenci United Methodist, including Rev. Andrea McCumber and Sherry Pierce (pictured), who is in charge of the regular Free Community Market that operates every Wednesday. Generally, the market is a food-focused pantry serving many in the Candler area, just west of Asheville. They were preparing for an expanded market to meet the needs of clients who had now, in most cases, been without water, power or electricity for almost two weeks. I volunteered with distribution on Wednesday and the market was full of volunteers, both regular (my mom and step-father Jeff- pictured below) and visitors from Rev. Andrea's husband's church in Asheville and folks from Charlotte that came up to help. Thank you to those of you who donated money, as it was given to Rev. Andrea's discretionary funds, as you can imagine the pop-up needs of congregants and community members increase and change daily in the storm aftermath.



The general feeling I witnessed was one of resilience and community building. More than once, I heard references to the communal surprise and grief of early covid, how we were physically isolated, but brought back in connection through technology. A natural disaster, such as this, with devastating loss of infrastructure and digital communication, is bringing people together physically, neighbors helping each other and putting others before themselves. In many neighborhoods, there were tables set up in front yards with offerings of free supplies. Several of my friends who are counselors, although exhausted holding the space of grief for their clients, are surprisingly encouraged by the sense of purpose and mutual caretaking of so many.

In the wake of devastation and grief like this natural disaster, it is clear that hope lies in the commandment of Jesus to "Love your neighbor as yourself." It is clear that hope lives strong in church communities, such as ours here at Congregational UCC reaching out to the small but mighty congregation at Montmorenci in Candler. In a time of heavy-heartedness, it is evident that one of God's greatest gifts to us is each other. As the great Mr. Rogers used to say, "Look for the helpers. You will always find people who are helping." Not surprisingly, he attributed this to his mother.

Thank you UCC family for being helpers, in every sense of the word.

NIN is a special mission offering of the United Church of Christ that supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States.

In 2024, the Neighbors in Need theme is "Mental Health Justice For All!" This year's focus is on Mental Health Justice. In 2015, the General Synod of the United Church of Christ passed a resolution to become WISE (Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive, and Engaged) for mental health. A just world for all is a world where the human rights and well-being of people with mental health challenges are respected, no matter who you are or where you are in life's mental health journey.

One-third of NIN funds support the <u>Council for American Indian Ministry</u> (CAIM). Two-thirds of this offering is used by the UCC's Justice and Witness Ministries (JWM) to support a variety of justice initiatives, advocacy efforts, and direct service projects through grants. Neighbors in Need grants are awarded to UCC churches and organizations doing justice work in their communities. These grants fund projects whose work ranges from direct service to community organizing and advocacy to address systemic injustice.

A SNAPSHOT OF THE UCCIC CHURCH BOARDS Opportunities to Serve in 2025

The At-Large Committee is currently working to fill vacancies on the various church boards. A term on a board is three years with the option to renew for a second three-year term. There are also openings to serve remaining terms for open seats varying from one to three years. The snapshots below give members an overview of the work of each board, as well as, the monthly meeting date and time. Please consider how you might serve our church community.

Christian Education

The Board of Christian Education supports the Sunday morning programming of children pre-k through 8th grade. Additionally the board supports the Christian Education Director by making collaborative decisions about Children Christian education as well as providing on-site execution before, after, and during special events. TheBoard of Christian Education also provides support for adult programming. Commitment to this board is not difficult since our church has been blessed with creative, talented, and nurturing directors both past and present. Meetings are FUN and at the church at 7:00pm on the first Tuesday of each month.

Diaconate

The Deacons meet on the third Tuesday of the month at 7 PM in Rockwood Hall. The responsibilities of the board are, including but not limited to, directing all matters pertaining to the spiritual life of the church in consultation with the pastor; preparing and serving communion; maintaining a system to provide greeters, ushers and hospitality for all scheduled worship services; and oversee the supplies needed for hospitality and communion.

Membership

The Membership Board develops ways to welcome everyone into our community of faith. The board organizes fellowship activities and events such as the Progressive dinner, special luncheons following the service, and the summer church picnic. Membership also maintains a system of communication to members in times of celebration, illness, grief, or emergency. Membership meets the third Tuesday of the month at 5:30pm at the church.

Mission

The Mission board responsibilities include education, advocacy, offerings, direct service and finances. Mission board organizes an annual adult education series focused on topics of social action. The board establishes priorities for action through direct service, special offerings or financial support. The Mission Board meets the first Tuesday of the month at 7pm at the church.

Stewardship

The Stewardship Board consists of at least 5 members elected to serve a term of three years. The mission is to encourage the principles of Christian stewardship in the church. Their responsibilities include: planning and administering the church's yearly stewardship efforts to fund the annual operating budget; planning and carrying out fundraising efforts for specific programs, building needs, and other projects; encouraging gifts to the Endowment Fund; and educating and helping members with their long-range estate and special gifts planning for the church. The Stewardship Board meets the third Tuesday of each month via Zoom.

Trustees

Trustee: a legal term which, in its broadest sense, is a synonym for anyone in a position of trust or responsibility for the benefit of another; the holder of property on behalf of another; persons who serve on a board of trustees of an institution that operates for a charity or non-profit entity.

The Board of Trustees is advised by three sub-committees: Finance, Technology and Personnel. The Trustees administer the resources of the Church, including, but not limited to monetary funds, the operating budget, property, buildings, other resources of value and the maintenance thereof.

The Board of Trustees (Trustees) has the distinct honor of taking care of a building originally constructed on a centrally located property in downtown Iowa City across the street from the first state Capitol building and the campus of the University of Iowa. It includes an exquisite original Tiffany stained glass window in the sanctuary.

The original church building was completed in 1869. Administration and Education wings were added in the 20th century. Over the years, various improvements have been made to structural, electrical, heating, cooling, sound, and technology systems, as well as a kitchen renovation and accessibility to the fellowship hall sanctuary and choir loft.

Trustees are also responsible for the financial integrity of the church's funds including investments, weekly collections and operating budget.

Serving as a Trustee is indeed a heady responsibility and a labor of love requiring the utmost attention of and by those involved in this effort. If you are willing to make such a commitment to protecting our past and ensuring our future, please consider joining us in this ministry. The Trustees meet at the church on the third Tuesday of the month at 7pm.

SERVING OUR CONGREGATION

Every year in January a slate of new members for the various church boards is presented to the congregation for approval. Work to prepare this slate occurs throughout the fall and is managed by the two Council Members At Large, Andrea Rauer and Marie Von Behren.

This work is now underway, and we would like to invite all members of the congregation to consider serving on a Board. Serving on a Board is an excellent way to develop close working relations with other members of the church.

What is involved in serving on a Board? Each of the six church Boards meet monthly, usually on a week day evening. Each of the boards has different responsibilities, and thus the tasks undertaken by each board are different. For example, the Membership Board plans the church picnic and other fellowship events; the Trustees provide oversight of the church budget and the building.

In addition to positions on church boards, there are also several positions representing the church to various agencies and organizations. Members of the church serve as representatives to the Eastern Iowa Association, the Community Pastoral Counseling Service, the Common Fund, and other organizations. As an alternative to serving on a church board, you might serve as a special church representative.

TRI-CONFERENCE (LOWA – NEBRASKA – SOUTH DAKOTA) OF THE UCC JOINT ANNUAL MEETING SEPTEMBER 27-29, 2024

Our delegates, Anna Mary Mueller and Phyllis Ruppert, were inspired by the Workshop on Age Conscious Ministry, Presenter Rev. Beth Long-Higgins <u>blong-higgins@uchinc.org</u> and would like to share brief, paraphrased highlights with you.

- --We need connection and belonging. With centenarians projected to quadruple in number by 2054, the church has an important role in systems and supports for older members.
- --Although the perceived idea is that it's downhill after retirement, we know that's not true. Neither is the idealized idea shown in commercials of older people climbing mountains and jumping out of planes the goal. We can't pit young against old. It's not healthy.
- --Positive aging self-perceptions are what we want because they can offer
 - --better memory
 - --balance (yes, physical balance)
 - --increased longevity by 7 ½ years
- --Generalizations such as 'people are happiest when children' need to be countered with evidence that shows contentment increases as we age. We've been created to age, to have meaning, purpose, call, and vocation that lead to contentment. We're to be in relationship with others and the Creator. That's why it's so important to encourage the old...along with the young...to dream dreams.
- --The older generation can promote the well-being of younger generations. How? How can we facilitate this relationship building? It can be as simple as having the church youth teach the congregation a song. That becomes instant gratification to the youth when they hear the older generations responding loudly, with the same enthusiasm by which they were taught.
- --All aging is change. What can we do to encourage and celebrate joy? We need to feel freer to choose how to use the years we have left. If one doesn't enjoy _____ anymore, choose to decline.
- --Should older members be/stay independent? No, we're created to be interdependent. Ask for assistance. Give others the chance to give help. Can you age being both independent and interdependent? Of course, just ground yourself with interdependence. Let your faith community be there as you plan the non-financial aspects of retirement. It's not just the financial aspect of retirement that requires planning; the non-financial aspects are vital to well-being.
