Friends in Christ:

Eight years ago, I began a newsletter article writing: "As I said in my sermon on the last Sunday in January, national and world events are moving so fast that a sermon that seems appropriate on Thursday might be woefully out of date by the time Sunday morning arrives. After quickly rewriting my sermon on Saturday, I told you that I had a feeling that we are moving into a time when there might be a lot of incomplete and inarticulate sermons."

Here we go again-but this is not simply "history repeats itself."

The fast-moving disruption challenges all of us to keep up to date while we keep our mental and spiritual well-being. When I ask members to describe either how they are feeling and what they sense as the mood of our congregation, I hear words such as discouraged, depressed, anxious, apprehensive, and despair. People are worried about the University and about Iowa farmers. Economic uncertainty is back. And, as I said, national and global circumstances change so quickly and dramatically that what I'm writing today might once again be "woefully out of date" when you read it.

Which, in an unexpected way, brings us to the season of Lent, those 40 days of preparation for the joy of Easter. Lent encourages us to focus on who/what we are and on who/what we are not. We are, as Ash Wednesday reminds us, dust—fragile, provisional, temporary, mortal. This is true of all human beings. We are not God. This, too, is true of all human beings. And at the same we are deeply loved by God, who desires abundance of life for all human beings.

Lent challenges us to look with honesty at our lives and our world. At Congregational UCC, we are people who recognize that such honesty is best achieved as we live together in community with one another. Together, we look at our world. Together, we find the strength to do the often difficult and always hope-filled work of making this world more like the one God desires.

In the days ahead, remember each week that the Sundays in Lent are not technically a part of that season. They are little "days of resurrection," weekly reminders not only of the grand celebration that we are moving toward but also of the hope in which we live each day, all year long.

So, I invite you, especially in this difficult year, to be a part of all that Congregational UCC offers as we prepare for the joy of Easter. Join us for a simple soup supper at 6:00 p.m. before our Ash Wednesday worship on March 5 at 7:00 p.m. Read the daily Lenten reflections—and write one. Participate in the adult education offerings. Give generously to One Great Hour of Sharing.

And in all things, seek the good.


Notes for March:

We meet immediate needs and you address the underlying causes that create those needs in the first place.

youth, and college students. We have childcare. We will provide a sub sandwich lunch at our first session and decide what to do for lunch (if anything) after that first session.


Please purchase your own book (\$14.00...Amazon offers used copies for less.) <u>and come to the class with</u> the first chapter and Bible readings done.

MEN'S BREAKFAST—MARCH 15




