Friends in Christ:

When the Vacation Bible School met in mid-August, they sang and created and ate some good food. They also explored what it means to belong.

In the Congregational tradition, belonging precedes believing. We don't have creeds or other tests for membership. We put a lot of stock in our covenant with each other. How we live toward one another is as important as what we believe. In owning the covenant of this church each of us agrees to belong to a believing community and, in that community, to work out our own beliefs.

In joining this congregation, people chose belonging. Each of us need a place to grow, a place to discover more of who we are, and a place to live out our identity.

That is to say, we need a congregation—the place where we are nurtured in our faith, the place that sends us out to show the love of God. The late South African Anglican Archbishop, Desmond Tutu, said: “Without us, God cannot.” God does not feed the hungry or shelter the homeless or love our neighbors. We are needed out beyond the walls of our church to show and tell the good news of God's love. We are needed to stand up for what is right when others won't. And we don't do any of this alone or without support. We have the backing of our congregation, this place where we belong. “Without us, God cannot.” And Tutu continues, “Without God, we cannot.”

When we go out into the world, we find ourselves coming back to this congregation as well. We come back to this place where we belong—for our own sake and for the sake of the rest of us. Without restoring ourselves in the worship of God, without learning the way of prayer with others we will soon burn out. Without gaining insight into the ways of God through study with others, we cannot do our work that so desperately needs to be done. When we are at our best, this congregation is a place of renewal. Here you find rest and welcome. And in your returning, you renew and change everyone else.

All lives might be enriched as we discover, reclaim, and share our liberal Christian faith together. Here, you belong. You belong here.

The American Cancer Society Hope Lodge, which opened in 2008, offers 28 guest rooms located near treatment centers in the area. The program provides a free home away from home for cancer patients and their caregivers. More than just a roof over their heads, it's a nurturing community that helps patients access the care they need. Each Hope Lodge, known as UCC Men's Supportive, homelike environment where guests can share a meal, join in the evening's activities, and unwind in their own private room. Patients staying at a Hope Lodge must be in active cancer treatment.

SENDING USED MEDICINE BOTTLES TO AFRICA FOR REUSE IN CLINICS—IMPORTANT REQUEST

1. Please donate only orange bottles; other colors should be recycled. Caps can be any color.
2. Bottles must have labels and all adhesive removed. Sticky bottles or bottles with residue should be recycled. I can't use them. If this is difficult for you, consider finding a partner who can help you prep the bottles.
3. Bottles should be washed in warm, soapy water. We don't want to inflict harm on individuals who could come into contact with foreign medicine.

100 Grannies, a local environmental activist group, is sending used plastic medicine bottles to Africa to assist clinics in distributing medication. Donna Hirst is in charge of this project and would be pleased to have participation from members of our congregation. For more information contact donna-hirst@uiowa.edu. MISSION BOARD REPORT



**SERVING TOGETHER.
IMPACTING OUR COMMUNITY.**



THE MISSION BOARD HAS HAD A BUSY SUMMER, PUTTING OUR CONGREGATION'S GENEROSITY TO WORK THROUGHOUT THE COMMUNITY AND MAKING PLANS FOR THE MONTHS AHEAD.



One of our major efforts is helping meet the ongoing need for diapers and feminine hygiene products. The Board approved \$3,000 for diapers, wipes, and feminine hygiene products to be distributed from August through November among the Coralville and North Liberty food pantries and Community.



We are also excited about the new Neighborhood Centers facility at the former Towncrest location. After visiting the facility and seeing its extensive wish list, the Board proposed \$3,000 to help with needed furnishings and equipment. Funding will be provided once Neighborhood Centers becomes a Trusted Partner.



Our first delivery went to the Coralville Food Pantry in August—as you can see in the picture, Andy and Dianne managed to fill the entire back of their van! An additional \$500 was designated for Open Heartland for feminine hygiene products. We also reaffirmed our previously approved \$3,000 contribution to Tate High School, with a request that some of those funds help provide feminine hygiene products for students.



Looking a little further ahead, we are already planning the January–February Adult Forum series. We will have five Sundays, January 10–February 7, and are considering a theme built around Earth, Fire, Water and Wind, exploring environmental and climate issues from several different perspectives.



Our support extends to several other organizations doing important work. The Board approved \$1,000 for One Iowa, a \$3,000 contribution to Mangrove Association, \$500 for the Refugee & Immigrant Association, and \$2,500 in special funds for Shelter House in connection with its BBQ Bash.



And finally, mark your calendar: Alternative Giving Sundays are planned for November 22 and December 13. More information will be coming as we get closer.



Thank you to everyone in our congregation whose generosity makes all of this possible. Whether we are filling a van with diapers, helping students get basic necessities, supporting community organizations, or planning opportunities to learn together, your contributions allow the Mission Board to turn our congregation's commitment to mission into action.



HABITAT, SOLAR UPDATE

The Habitat for humanity Carbon offset solar project has raised \$14,664 for this year's solar installations. \$5,000 of that came from our congregational United Church of Christ mission board. A house is currently being completed at 1519 Prairie du Chein Rd. The total cost for the solar array on that house is \$12,440. (The balance will go toward the next house). It is a 5.28 kW system expected to produce 163,000 kWh of electricity during its expected lifespan. This should offset approximately 70 metric tons of CO2 or 154,000 pounds. Not only is this array decreasing CO2 in the atmosphere; it is dramatically helping a low income Iowa family with their energy bills. There will be a dedication ceremony at the house at 6 PM on September 23 for anyone interested in attending!

I hope you will all keep the donations coming!
