MISSION BOARD FOOD DRIVE IN NOVEMBER: As many of you know, the government shutdown is resulting in a suspension of SNAP benefits starting Nov 1. This will lead to significant problems for those depending on these benefits to purchase food. In addition, food banks have been very stressed as the price of food has risen considerably. The Mission Board is sponsoring a food drive in November to respond to this crisis. Please bring stable shelf items to the church on the Sundays in November and the MB will deliver to the local food banks. If you prefer a monetary gift, just place it in the offering plate and it will be sent. As you consider the items to donate, be aware that many boxed items require additional ingredients such as butter and milk for mac and cheese boxes, and meat for hamburger helper. If those items are not available, the food is not useful. Protein sources, such as tuna, canned chicken and peanut butter are often requested.

DR. JAMES ZOGBY JOINS VETERANS FOR PEACE ARMISTICE DAY

OBSERVANCE: On Tuesday, Nov. 11, 2025, beginning at 11 a.m., the local chapter of Veterans For Peace will hold three public events in Iowa City to re-dedicate ourselves to the work of peace. Members of the public are encouraged to attend.

- 1) Beginning at 10:45 a.m., we will assemble at the Iowa City Ped Mall. Bells will ring at the 11th hour, 11th day, 11th month, as is tradition. Dr. James Zogby will make brief remarks. In 1985, Zogby co-founded the Arab American Institute, a Washington, D.C.-based organization which serves as the political and policy research arm of the Arab American community. He continues to serve as its president. Zogby is also Director of Zogby Research Services, a firm that has conducted groundbreaking surveys across the Middle East.
- 2) Immediately following the outdoor observance, Veterans For Peace will host a free luncheon at the Iowa City Public Library. Dr. Zogby will address the group in a longer format. His topic is "The war that didn't end all wars and instead launched a century of conflict."
- 3) At 6:30 p.m., Veterans For Peace will sponsor a screening of the film "Earth's Greatest Enemy," a film by Abby Martin at Film Scene, 404 East College Street, Iowa City. This is a documentary exposé of the world's biggest—and most unaccountable—polluter: the US military. Learn the environmental cost of having a military Empire. Co-director/co-author of the film, Mike Prysner, will attend and offer brief remarks before the screening. He will host a question-and-answer period immediately afterward. Film Scene requests a free will donation to attend. This is the sole Armistice Day observance in the State of Iowa.

CARBON OFFSET HELPS HABITAT FOR HUMANITY: Have you ever wanted to compensate for CO2 emissions from a flight or other carbon intensive activity? Carbon offsets are a recognized way to make an activity carbon neutral. Carbon offsets are also often viewed with skepticism due to concerns about whether the money given is truly decreasing carbon emissions and whether the action would have happened without the donation.

Those concerns can be assuaged with a donation to put solar arrays on Habitat for Humanity homes. The homeowners do not have the resources to make an upfront investment in a solar array and once installed the system is likely to stay in place for the lifetime of the panels. In addition to reducing CO2 emissions the donor would be helping a low income Iowa family with their energy bills.
