UI Lecture Committee announces the Cassandra S. Foens M.D. 2021 Lecture to be held on Tuesday Feb 16 at 7:00 pm. The title will be: "The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks": A Discussion on Race and Medical Ethics

Henrietta Lacks was a young Black woman who was treated at the Johns Hopkins Hospital in the early 1950's for an aggressive case of cancer. At the time of surgery, a Hopkins physician/scientist used cells from her tumor to create an immortalized cell line (designated as HeLa cells) which has been widely used in research over the years. This use of her tissue was

done without her consent. The case received wide attention in recent years due to the publication of the book "The Immortal Life of Henrietta Lacks", written by Rebecca Skloot.

The lecture committee has invited two members of the Lacks family to come and serve as a panel. Congregational UCC member, Dr. Andy Bertolatus, will serve as moderator. This will be a virtual lecture - it will be livestreamed at https://lectures.uiowa.edu/live/. It will also be recorded and made available after the livestream.
