COMMUNITIES ACTING IN CRISIS: This morning we will look at the part the churches played in creating the 1989-91 "Monday Demonstrations" in Leipzig, Germany, that led to the collapse of East Germany and the coming down of the Wall.

This week we will "crowd source" the information that we will bring to the discussion. You can begin your investigation by reading the Wikipedia article on the demonstrations <u>here</u>. Then you can search further on Google to find the bits and pieces of information scattered on the Web. Then we'll come together to share what we know. Robin Thomas-Lovin will lead the discussion and she will hand out excerpts from a book (!) on the demonstrations.

On the Sundays in Lent, Bill Lovin is leading the Adult Education sessions, looking at "Communities Acting in Crisis." We'll explore how Christian communities responded to protect people, stand up for the rights of others and themselves, and challenge authorities in difficult times.
